TAFT MAY GO TO KENTUCKY.
He is invited to the Exercises at Lincoln Farm.

Lexington, Ky., March 31.—Announcement was made here yesterday that President Taft is to be at the Lincoln Farm May 30, to take part in the memorial services and plant a tree in honor of Lincoln. President Taft has the matter under consideration. Mr. Frost is at the head of the movement to raise \$400,000 for a negro school to be established in Kentucky, and which now lacks only \$16,000 of completion. It is called the Lincoln Memorial Institute, in honor of Abraham Lincoln.

FIREMEN HEMMED IN.
Trapped by Flames on Eighth Floor and Have Narrow Escape.

New York, March 31.—During a fierce blaze that threatened the total destruction of the Smith-Gray building, 238-238 Fifth avenue, yesterday, the firemen of engine 1 were hemmed in on the eighth floor by a wall of flame, so that for 10 minutes their escape was out of the question. After the most trying kind of an experience the fire fighters succeeded in reaching the windows in spite of the dense smoke and intense heat, where they waited to be rescued by the men of engine 26, who were cutting a path through the flames with a powerful stream of water. But for this action of the rescuers it is doubtful if the crew of engine 1 would have been able to fight their way back to the door by which they entered.

The fire originated on the eighth floor, which is occupied by Wells, Colburn & Wilkins, manufacturers of neckwear and suspenders. The firemen succeeded in confining the blaze to this floor and limiting the damage to about \$2,000.
