WAIT IN VAIN FOR MOTHER.

Four Little Children in Hospital Don't Know of Her Death.

New York, April 10.—Mrs. Catherine Davis lies dead of scarlet fever on North Brother island. Her body awaits burial by the husband, who, the police say, deserted her five weeks ago. In the isolation ward of Bellevue hospital alone save for the nurse who attends them, the dead woman's four children—James Rogan, 9 years old; Margaret, 10; Charlotte, 7, and Rose, 5—wait for their mother. They were taken to Bellevue hospital a week ago neighbors notified the board of health that there was serious illness in the Davis home, a flat at 311 East 100th street. That was three weeks after the husband and father had disappeared.

Dr. Gillette found that Mrs. Davis was ill of scarlet fever, and she was removed to quarantine on North Brother island where she died on Tuesday. That left the four children alone in the flat. A kindly neighbor took baby Rose to her home and cared for her.

At 11 o'clock Sunday night the police found the three little Rogans "sleeping home" alone in the flat—waiting for mother to get well and come back," they said. They were taken to Bellevue hospital.

SHOOTS GIRL; KILLS SELF.

Believed She Had Refused to Marry Suitor Who Attempted Her Life.

New York April 10.—Anna Miller, a young woman employed in the family of Arthur Sleigh, superintendent of the Ladies Belting Works at Glen Cove, L. I., was shot and probably fatally wounded yesterday at the Sleigh home by Charles J. Dayton, her sweetheart. Dayton then shot and killed himself. It is believed by the authorities that Dayton shot her because she had refused to marry him.

Mr. Sleigh was the first to be aroused by the pistol shots. He rushed up stairs to the room of the girl. The door had been locked and he burst it open. The girl was unconscious and badly wounded. Dayton lay on the floor, still grasping the pistol, and with an ugly wound in the temple. Investigation showed that he was dead.

An examination by the physician showed that the girl had a chance of recovery, although dangerously wounded.

SLOW WORK AT MESSINA

Situation There Terrible, it is Reported

LITTLE HAS BEEN DONE

King and Queen Dissatisfied, It is Asserted—No Assistance Is Being Given to the Merchants.

New York, April 10.—A cable from Messina to the New York Times says:

The present state of Messina, more than three months after the great earthquake, is no better than in the days immediately following the catastrophe. No arrangements have yet been made to clear away the city's ruins. The area front only is available for traffic, and even that is two-thirds full of rubbish excavated from the ruined houses and stacked 20 feet high. The stream tramway running along this sea front, extending for 40 miles along the north coast and for 20 miles southward, and connecting Messina with the villages, would have rendered vast assistance to the populace and laborers in the work of clearance, but it is not available, nor are there prospects of an early resumption of the service, since the municipality has no energy and no funds to pay the arrears due to the tramway company. It is, therefore, forced to await the company's decision regarding a project to electrify the service.

Exceedingly little has been done in the work of erecting shelters. Most of the rough huts existing have been built by the inhabitants, who had to buy the wood and pay labor for the work of building. There is no sanitation of any kind, neither is there any sanitary inspection. Millions upon millions of large-buzzing flies swarm over the unsanitary piles, carrying deadly germs broadcast among the populace.

Among the articles of food sold in the little huts, which are used as shops, are many that have been recovered from the ruins of the shops in the town, which were under blocks of fats.

There is practically no illumination at night in the ruined city nor any possibility of transit.

ITALIAN DIRIGIBLE DAMAGED.

Its Engine Breaks Down and It Descends.

Sebio, Italy, April 9.—The dirigible balloon Italia's trials Wednesday ended disastrously. After maneuvering for some time at a height of 1,500 feet, the engine broke down and the balloon descended precipitately. It was badly damaged but the aeronauts were not hurt.

Soldier Had Changed His Name After Running Away From Home.

Kansas City, Mo., April 10.—John Alfred Kohler, known to his comrades as Johnny Alfred, a soldier stationed at Jefferson barracks, near St. Louis, met his long lost brother, Kit Kohler, in the latter's home here last night after 24 years of searching.

Johnny Alfred ran away from home when 4 years old, was taken up and sent to an orphan's home. He forgot his full name. Recently his comrades urged him to endeavor to find his relatives.

Kohler did so, writing a letter to the Kansas City Star, detailing his history, and it was read by Kit. After the reunion here, it developed that the lost boy had lived for several years next door to Fred Kohler, another brother, in St. Joseph, Mo., without discovering their relationship.

LAND CASE COMPLETED.

The Haskell Decision, However, Is Reserved.

Tulsa, Okla., April 9.—Arguments were concluded Wednesday in the motion to quash the indictments against Governor C. N. Haskell and five co-defendants on land fraud charges growing out of the acquisition of town lots in Muskogee. The motion was taken under advisement by United States District Judge Marshall of Utah, who is trying the case. The court's ruling is not expected for several days. Pending the decision the attorneys will remain here. Governor Haskell, Mrs. Haskell and their son Joseph returned to Guthrie Wednesday night.

Workmen Dig Up \$8,500.

Lexington, April 10.—While digging in an abandoned lot here, workmen found a brass kettle containing \$8,500 in gold and silver. It had apparently been buried for half a century.

COAL MEN FAR APART

Operators Reject the Modified Demands

CONFERENCE ADJOURNED

The Miners Meet to Plan Further Action—Had Hoped New Form of Recognition Would Be Accepted.

Philadelphia, April 10.—Although a disagreement was reached at the concluding conference of the anthracite operators and miners yesterday concerning the question of a wage agreement in the hard coal fields of Pennsylvania, there will be no strike, and the only danger of a suspension of mining, according to the mine workers' officials, arises from the possibility of the refusal of the operators to permit the miners to work without an agreement.

Following the adjournment of the conference, the mine workers held a meeting and adjourned shortly after one o'clock for luncheon. At the conclusion of the meeting a statement was issued on the situation.

The miners and operators failed to reach an agreement yesterday and have finally adjourned. The operators rejected the modified demands presented on Thursday by the miners. The answer of the operators was given to the mine workers yesterday in a conference which lasted more than an hour.

The Miners' New Proposal.

In the modified proposal the miners agreed to the renewal of the recently expired wage agreement with a few changes, which were provided for in the following language:

"It is further understood and agreed that if wages of employees have been reduced during the last three years under the stipulation that it was new work for other causes, such wages shall be restored. It is further agreed that the right to hire and discharge is vested exclusively in the mine manager or operator. The persons discharged shall have the right of appeal and if it is shown that they were discharged without cause shall be reinstated.

"No suspension of operation shall take place during the adjustment of differences between employer and employe."

TRIBUTE TO PETROSINO.

Flags at Halfmast, Marking Arrival of Body of Detective from Italy.

New York, April 10.—Flags flying at halfmast above the city hall and police headquarters yesterday marked the arrival on the steamer Slavonia of the body of Lieutenant Joseph Petrosino of the New York police department, who was assassinated in Palermo, Sicily, on March 12, while engaged in protecting America against Sicilian criminals.

City officials, Italian societies and citizens will unite in giving further expression of tribute to Petrosino on Monday, when his funeral will be held.

Plans had been made for an extended escort of Petrosino's body to his home in Lafayette street, had the Slavonia arrived Thursday according to schedule. Owing to the delay, she came into port on Good Friday and the plans changed.

On arrival at the quarantine station, the Slavonia was met by the police boat Patrol and with little delay the body of the detective was transferred from the steamer and conveyed to the landing place at the Battery. Thence it was escorted to the Petrosino home in Lafayette street, to be guarded by police until after the funeral.

The transfer of the body from the ship to the Patrol was witnessed by the committee of citizens including a number of prominent Italians who went down the harbor on a tug and participated in the ceremonies attending the landing.

Unusual honors expressive of the city's appreciation of Petrosino's courage and devotion to duty will be shown at the funeral on Monday. Solemn high mass will be celebrated in St. Patrick's cathedral and after the services the body will be escorted to Calvary cemetery by a parade composed of police, military and members of many Italian societies with mourning flags and banners and bands. Drums will be muffled and "taps" will be sounded at the grave.

Many flowers, including a wreath from Mayor McCallan, have been sent to the Petrosino home and a movement is under way to provide Mrs. Petrosino and the detective's child with a home and ample funds.

On the way up the harbor many passing vessels dipped their flags to the Patrol. Marchese Giovinetto di Passano, Italian vice-consul at this port, an attaché of the consulate, several representatives of Italian societies, two troops of mounted police and a crowd of several hundred persons gathered at the pier as Petrosino's body was landed. Escorted by the mounted police, a guard of honor of 21 policemen, and six picked policemen as pallbearers, the hearse containing the body was escorted up Broadway.

Heads were bared as the procession moved along the route.

When the procession reached the Petrosino home in Lafayette street and the body was carried within, Mrs. Petrosino became almost hysterical. She pleaded for permission to view her dead husband's face, and, on her behalf, the officials will be petitioned to allow the casket to be opened in her presence. The body will be taken to-day to the rooms of the March association, where it will remain until the time for the funeral.

SWISS CHAMOIS FOR AMERICA.

An Official Present from Bernese Government.

Berne, April 10.—The Swiss government has presented to the government of the United States five magnificent Alpine chamois. The animals, three does and two bucks from the Burnen Oberland, were shipped for America yesterday, accompanied by an experienced caretaker.

AUTOS KILL 101 IN GOTHAM.

Figures Since Jan. 1, 1908; Killing of Reckless Drivers Urged.

New York, April 9.—The use of automobiles since Jan. 1, 1908, has cost the city of New York 101 lives. No accurate list of accidents which did not result fatally is obtainable. The authorities declare the increase in the number of deaths is a matter of the deepest concern to reputable owners of automobiles no less than to the authorities themselves.

Commissioner Bingham was asked what means he would suggest to end the present epidemic of speeding which has resulted in so many deaths and injuries.

"Send a few reckless drivers to jail and keep them there for a while and you would soon have fewer accidents," he declared emphatically. "In the last couple of years we have only been able to secure two or three prison sentences; and in the last year, we have only been able to have two licenses revoked in spite of many offences. It isn't up to the police department," he added, "we make the arrests."

TAMPERING WITH OUR MAIL.

Official Dispatches Mutilated by Nicaragua.

Washington, April 9.—The Nicaraguan mutilation of official dispatches to this government and continued grave conditions in Central America are under earnest consideration by the Washington government. Investigations have convinced the officials here that cipher dispatches passing between John H. Gregory, the American charge at Managua, Nicaragua, and the state department at Washington, were purposely mutilated, while Nicaragua was engaged in unusual military activity. The situation in Central America continues unsettled, due, according to reports reaching Washington, to the continued military activity of Nicaragua.

SUGAR "TRUST" SETTLES.

Messenger in the Office of Joseph Pulitzer One of Witnesses.

New York, April 9.—Inquiry into the alleged libel published in connection with the Panama canal purchase was resumed by the federal grand jury here yesterday. Special Attorney-General Stuart McNamara examined the witnesses, the first of whom was John Hadwin, a negro messenger in the office of Joseph Pulitzer, proprietor of the World. Mr. McNamara, who conducted the Panama investigation in Washington had caused several witnesses to be summoned yesterday, among those who appeared being C. M. White, assistant cashier of the Press Publishing company, and Earl Harding and David Ferguson, reporters on the staff of the World.

GOOD FEE FOR ENGINEERS.

Those Who Went With Taft Get \$25,000 Each.

Washington, April 9.—After a conference with the president yesterday Secretary of War Dickinson announced that the six consulting engineers who accompanied Mr. Taft to the Isthmus of Panama shortly before his inauguration would receive as compensation for their service a fee of \$25,000 each and expenses.
