PLANS FOR THE RAILROADS

Taft's Ideas on Government Regulation

CLOSER RELATIONS IDEA

Upper House Is in Danger—More Arrests Expected Because of Sugar Directors Mixing in the Political Affairs.

Washington, April 16.—The feasibility of establishing some form of quasi-official organization between the railroads and the federal government is being seriously considered by the attorney general, the secretaries of the interior and commerce and labor and the solicitor-general, to whom the president has confided the responsibility of working out his plans with regard to federal control of the railroads.

The plan concerns the existence of such quasi-official bodies abroad and their usefulness in promoting co-operation between the government and public service corporations. In Great Britain, for instance, boards of trade prepare certain data regarding the service rendered by such corporations, and submit recommendations concerning the reasonableness of rates, etc.

The president has called the attention of his advisers to the fact that a single body charged simultaneously with quasi-judicial and administrative functions, as is now the case with the interstate commerce commission, is constantly hampered in its efforts to ascertain the facts by the antagonism which is inevitably engendered as a result of its being compelled to conduct prosecutions.

It has occurred to the president that possibly some semi-official body, such as a national chamber of commerce or similar organization, might be able to relieve the commission of a part of its duties as an investigating and prosecuting body.

Another proposition which is being considered is the possibility and advisability of divorcing the administrative and judicial functions of the commission. This, the president regards as essential. Still another plan involves the transfer of the administrative and investigating functions of the commission to another body, probably the bureau of commerce and labor, thus leaving the commission with only judicial functions.

TAFT TO BE AT UNVEILING.

President Will Deliver Address at Shaft in South to Northern Troops.

Washington, April 17.—President Taft yesterday accepted an invitation extended by a joint delegation representing the states of Pennsylvania and Virginia to attend and speak at the unveiling of the monument erected at Fort Mahone, near Petersburg, Va., in memory of the Pennsylvania soldiers who fell there during the war between the states.

Mr. Taft said he had heard much of the qualifications necessary in a president of the United States, but after 30 days' experience in the office he was convinced that one of the chief requisites was the ability to resist invitations. He had not progressed so far in that line.

DOUBTS DICKINSON'S DEMOCRACY.

Bryan Ridicules the Claims of Taft's Secretary of War.

Lincoln, Neb., April 17.—A full page of Mr. Bryan's Commoner is devoted to ridiculing the claim of Secretary of War Dickinson that he is a Democrat. Mr. Bryan says it will not break the solid South, but simply arouse real Democrats to actively repudiate masqueraders in party lines. Dickinson, he says, is not a Democrat at all, as Democracy is defined in recent party platforms. A paragraph reads:

"If the president wanted to appoint a Democrat, he ought to appoint a sure enough Democrat and not one in name only. The president was not under any obligations to appoint a Democrat to his cabinet. It would have been a surprise to everyone if he had appointed one. In fact, there would have been unanimous protest from his party if he had appointed a sure enough Democrat; and that they do not expect him to act as a Democrat."

RUSHING PHILIPPINE BILL.

The House Committee Will Hold Hearings.

Washington, April 17.—In order that no time may be lost in having the new Philippine tariff bill passed as a compromise to the Payne tariff bill, the House ways and means committee will begin hearings on the measure commencing next Tuesday. Brigadier General Edwards, chief of the insular bureau of the war department, will explain to the committee the necessity for the enactment of the measure so that it will become operative simultaneously with the Philippine free trade provisions of the Payne bill. General Edwards will be accompanied by several of the custom officials from the islands, who will explain the various features of the bill, and the methods by which the duties improved were determined upon. Other witnesses also are expected to appear before the committee.

OLD SYSTEM ON CENSUS.

The Plan for State Examinations Is Killed.

Washington, April 17.—The conference on the census bill yesterday agreed to strike out the Senate amendments to the bill which requires applicants for civil service positions to take their examinations in the state in which they reside and in which, according to the amendments, they shall have resided for one year previous to taking the examination.

LABOR MEN CALL ON TAFT

Desires of the A. F. of L. Presented to President

JAS. DUNCAN ONE OF THEM

Give President Brief Outline of Legislation They Would Like to Have Enacted—Promised to Consider Their Views.

Washington, April 17.—President Taft yesterday received the members of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor, headed by Samuel Gompers. They presented an outline of the legislation they would like to have enacted. Mr. Taft greeted the labor leaders pleasantly and promised to consider their views.

In the delegation were a number of officials of the federation who figured prominently in the presidential campaign of last fall when they worked against Mr. Taft. In addition to President Gompers, there were Frank Morrison, secretary of the federation; James Duncan, John Mitchell, James O'Connell, Max Morris, William Huber, John B. Lennon, John R. Alpine and Joseph Valentine.

The labor leaders are said to be particularly interested in an endeavor to have the Sherman anti-trust law amended with reference to the provisions that effect the right of labor to strike and boycott; to secure legislation which will prevent the abuse of the power of injunction by courts, to secure a stricter enforcement of the eight-hour law on all government work, including contracts and to have enacted a government liability law which will provide for the payment of damages to workmen injured on government work.

The conditions of the unemployed workmen of the country and practical means of finding employment for this class under federal, state and municipal governments, was the principal matter considered at yesterday's session of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor. The whole question was referred to President Gompers.

CUMMINS FOR INCOME TAX.

His Amendment to Tariff Bill Differs from Bailey's.

Washington, April 17.—Senator Cummins of Iowa will introduce an amendment to the tariff bill, Monday, providing for the imposition of an income tax. His amendment will differ from Senator Bailey's in that it will probably be a graduated tax and will reach incomes of less than \$5,000; also it will be limited to individual incomes, exempting corporation incomes.

The progressive Republicans, of whom Senator Cummins is one, are putting forward the argument in support of an income tax that the bill reported by the finance committee will not yield enough revenue to meet public needs and that the income tax is necessary. They feel by an agreement with the Democratic senators they can secure the adoption of some form of income tax.

It is certain that the injection of the subject into the tariff situation will delay adjournment by prolonging the debate. An adjourned meeting of the Democratic senatorial conference took place at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. At the meeting Wednesday, the Democratic senators put themselves on record in favor of Senator Bailey's income tax amendment as a party measure. They also adopted a resolution declaring it to be the general policy of the Democrats in legislating on the tariff to vote for lower duties on necessities and higher duties on luxuries.

The income tax amendment is expected to command the entire support of the Democrats in the Senate, but three or four Democrats have expressed doubts as to the wisdom of enacting such a law. At least one senator, who was a member of the House in 1894, when the Wilson-Gorham bill passed, is on record as voting against the proposed income tax that became a feature of that law.

The conference yesterday afternoon took up the details of duties. The indications were that they would decide to vote for a duty of 81 on rough lumber and 10 per cent. duty on hides.

FULTON DECLINES.

Former Senator Will Not Be Minister to China.

Washington, April 17.—Former Senator Fulton of Oregon has telegraphed to the president declining his recent offer of appointment as minister to China. Mr. Fulton informs the president that he has decided to resume the practice of law. President Taft earnestly desired to appoint Mr. Fulton to the new federal judgeship in Oregon, but by reason of factional troubles in the state it was found impracticable to do so.

NAVIGATION OPENS.

Steamboats Break Their Way Into Lake Erie.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 17.—Navigation opened at this port yesterday morning when the steamboats Charles A. Weston and D. R. Hanna cleared and broke their way through the ice at this end of Lake Erie. Both boats are manned by non-union crews. No trouble is being experienced along the water front as a result of the strike now in progress.

MOTOR OWNER RESPONSIBLE.

A New York Justice So Instructs the Jury.

New York, April 17.—The jury in the case of James H. Sullivan, an ironworker suing to recover damages for injuries sustained by being run over by an automobile, was instructed by Justice Fitzgerald, in the supreme court here on Thursday, to disregard the fact that the owner of the automobile was not an occupant of the vehicle at the time of the accident and to render a verdict for \$1,000 damages. The case establishes the principle that the owner of an auto-

mobile is responsible for the negligence or recklessness of his chauffeur irrespective of whether or not he is himself an occupant of the machine at the time of the display of this negligence or recklessness.

NO RECOMPENSE FOR WHITES.

Only the Negroes Who Suffered in the Springfield Riots Can Recover.

Springfield, Ill., April 17.—Only the negroes who suffered at the hands of the mobs of Aug. 14 and 15, or their heirs can recover damages for death or injury from the city under the statute relative to mobs, according to a decision rendered in the circuit court, sustaining the demurrer of the city in the cases of a number of whites who were killed and injured during the race riots.

CLARK AGAIN ATTACKS BRYAN.

Now He Calls Him "That Nebraska Populist."

Tallahassee, Fla., April 17.—Asserting that he is answerable to his constituents and not to the legislature, Congressman Frank Clark opposed the resolution by Representative Alexander, denouncing him for alleged utterances made on the floor of the national House of Representatives in a two hours' speech before the Florida House Thursday night. The resolutions are set for a special order for April 27. Mr. Clark reiterated his attacks upon Bryan, designating him as "that Nebraska Populist." He said that Bryan is already a prospective leader for 1912.

"Yes, I'll work for him again if he is nominated by the party in 1912," he said, in reply to a question. "The people of the South in '72 had to hold their noses and vote for Horace Greely," continued Mr. Clark. "No self-respecting white Democrat in the South can stand for the further effort of this man to reach the presidency, when he believes in the government ownership of railroads."

Under this system, he claimed, negroes would hold all positions on the railroads, as they now hold them in the free delivery service.

RETAIL OUTLOOK GOOD.

Well Sustained Progress in Business Is Reported.

New York, April 17.—Dispatches to R. G. Dun & Co. indicate well sustained progress in the business situation, although recovery is naturally slow. Easter trade was generally satisfactory in all sections. Improvement is more noticeable in the commercial situation at Boston, several branches that have ruled quiet since the opening of the year reflecting increased activity and a firmer tone.

Shoe manufacturers receive a larger volume of orders and the footwear industry as a whole is in a more satisfactory condition than for several weeks. The outlook for retail trade is considered good and practically all merchants express satisfaction with the volume of Easter business.

For the current week total bank exchanges at all leading cities in the United States are \$2,564,541,329. At the leading cities outside of New York, clearings are 12.3 per cent. larger than in the corresponding week of 1906.

ELMIRA, N. Y., MAN SHOT DOWN.

His Assailant Supposed to Have Been a Discharged Employee.

Elmira, N. Y., April 17.—Joseph McCann, a prominent meat dealer of this city, was shot down on the street in the center of the city yesterday while on his way to his store. Two bullets entered his body. He was taken to the hospital and is not expected to live. His assailant is supposed to have been Raymond Gill, a young man who had been employed by Mr. McCann and who had been dismissed because of an alleged shortage in his accounts.
