35 ANARCHISTS SENTENCED.

Two Get Death Sentences, the Rest Are Transferred.

Calcutta, May 7.—Sentences were handed down in the court of Alipur, a suburb of Calcutta, in the cases of the thirty-five natives who were arrested here last summer charged with complicity in the anarchist conspiracy of May, 1908.

Two of the men were condemned to death, ten to transportation for life, three to transportation for ten years, three to transportation for seven years, while seventeen were acquitted.

Ashutosh Biswas, a public prosecutor, who was engaged in the conduct of these cases, was shot dead in the Alipur court last February. The hearing of the cases which were decided yesterday led to the discovery of a factory of bombs in Calcutta.

PREPARING FOR ARBITRATION.

The Hague Court to Take Up Case of Fisheries.

The Hague, May 7.—Arrangements are being conducted here for the hearings of the Anglo-American fisheries questions by the court of arbitration toward the end of 1909. It is expected that the arbitration of the questions in dispute between the United States and Venezuela will be taken up early in 1910.
