Boston, May 8.—The Doves got away with yesterday's game with the Giants, 3 to 1, after a pretty contest. Dormer, aside from his wildness, pitched a good game, allowing but four hits in eight innings. Masters finished after Graham had made a safe hit for Dormer in the eighth. Marquand pitched for New York and kept the five hits well scattered. But one of his passes was responsible for the first of the two tallies by the locals in the eighth, as Dormer's third free ticket to Tenney was in the seventh. Dormer had thrown out Myers in the seventh and struck out Marquand when Tenney came up and drew a pass. McCormick and Murray singled in succession, sending Tenney over. Dahlen's fine stop off O'Hara ended the batting rally. The next inning Marquand passed Dahlen and Sweeney's smash for two bases scored Dahlen. On Sweeney's out, Sweeney went to third. Then Graham was sent in to bat for Dormer and he laid down a bunt which Meyers tried to field, leaving the home plate uncovered so that Sweeney dashed home with what proved to be the winning tally. MR. WIZARD GABELLONI

Pitched Almost a No-Hit Game Yesterday

THE ONLY HIT WAS A SCRATCH WHICH FINDER WAITED FOR TOO LONG—GABELLONI ALSO HELPED WITH HIT BAT TO A 4 TO 0 VICTORY.

The small crowd who risked a wetting to see the base ball game between the Italian Athletic club and the Vergennes high school at the Berlin street grounds yesterday afternoon were more than repaid for their trouble, for they witnessed an excellent game in which the Italians shut out the visitors, 4 to 0. Gabeltoni was the shining light of the game, pitching practically a no-hit game, striking out thirteen men and besides lacing the ball for a two-bagger and a single. The only semblance of a hit that the visitors got was a scratch made by Taft in the ninth inning. The hit was a slow grounder to Malberini, who fielded it clean but waited too long for it to roll to him, so that the runner beat it out.

The Italians played with only two errors, both being made by Malberini on easy ground hits. The visitors could do nothing with Gabeltoni's shoots and hardly a ball was knocked out of the diamond. Not a Vergennes runner got by second base and only two got that far. In every inning but the second and ninth, the high school went out in regular order, two, three order. Labouf, the high school twirler, allowed only six hits, but they were bunched into two innings and his wildness gave five cheap bases. The Italians scored first in the third inning, when they tallied three of their four scores. Cella opened the inning by lacing out a single into center field. David fanned out to the catcher and Malberini got first base on four balls, forcing Cella to second. Gabeltoni then singled into left field, filling the bases. Calagni fanned, making the second out, but Colombo rapped the ball into right for a clean single that scored Cella and Malberini, Gabeltoni landing at third and scoring on a throw back from the catcher that the pitcher let get by him. Broggi closed the inning on a hit in front of the plate.

The locals' last tally came in the seventh. David, the first batter up, swiped out a single into right and went to second when the center fielder made a wild throw to first after catching out Malberini. Gabeltoni then clouted out a two-bagger by the center fielder, scoring David. Calagni fanned and Broggi fanned out to right, ending the inning. The visitors crawled out of a tight hole in the second lining when the locals had three men on bases and Labouf fanned Nicora for the third out. The score:

JUDGE PHILLIPS TO REPLY.

He Welcomes a Congressional Investigation.

Kansas City, Mo., May 8.—Federal Judge Phillips, against whom impeachment proceedings are threatened, said: "If impeachment proceedings are inaugurated I shall answer the imputations. I shall welcome the investigation of a congressional committee should charges be made. But if no such proceedings are started I shall reserve the right to make public statement later, answering all the charges included in the resolution of Congressman Murphy. 'There is nothing in Representative Murphy's statements which requires an explanation from me, as I see.' Frank Hagerman, leading counsel for the railroad, said yesterday, when shown the dispatch from Washington: 'If my telegram to Attorney General Wickham stated that the state had been accorded every courtesy in the rate cases, the state's experts testified on the stand that they had been accorded every courtesy in the inspection of the books and records, and the records will show that no temporary injunction was granted without notice to the state. There is a difference between a preliminary restraining order and a temporary injunction. One requires notice and the other does not.'"

SAYS RAINS WAS RATIONAL.

The Defense Cross-examines a State Alienist. Flushing, N. Y., May 8.—Anticipations of possible further developments regarding the feeling in army circles over the case of Captain Peter C. Hains, Jr., suggested by Thursday's testimony of army officers called by the prosecution, stimulated interest in yesterday's proceedings at the trial of Captain Hains for the killing of William E. Annis. When court opened yesterday the state still had fifteen witnesses on its list to call in rebuttal. Dr. Horace G. Hughton, the last witness called by the prosecution Thursday, was cross-examined by Mr. McIntyre when proceedings were resumed yesterday. The witness attended Annis on the yacht club boat directly after the shooting and testified Thursday that the captain's speech and conduct at that time were rational.

SOCIALIST EDITOR CONVICTED.

Gilty of Misuse of Mails in Connection With Taylor Kidnaping Affair. Fort Scott, Kan., May 8.—Fred Warren, business manager and editor of a Socialist publication, charged by the government with sending scurrilous and defamatory matter through the mails, was Thursday afternoon found guilty by a jury in the federal court here. An appeal will be taken. Warren was charged with sending an envelope through the mails bearing the following inscription printed in red ink: "One thousand dollars reward for anyone who will kidnap Governor Taylor of Kentucky and return him to Kentucky." Thirty thousand of these envelopes were mailed, it was said.

MORSE SAYS HE IS PENNILESS

He Has Nothing Left of His \$30,000,000

HOW HE LOST FORTUNE

All of His Stocks, Bonds and Real Estate Have Gone to Pay His Creditors, and They Are Still Unsatisfied.

New York, May 8.—Charles W. Morse, the former banker, who is now in the Tombs prison under sentence for violation of the national banking law, has not a share of stock, a bond or a piece of real estate left of his former estate of an estimated value of \$30,000,000, according to evidence which he gave in supplementary proceedings last week and which was made public yesterday. Morse was one of the largest holders of securities of the \$60,000,000 Consolidated Steamship company and controlled three national banks. He testified in the supplementary proceedings that he had given all his property to creditors to secure his debts and declared that he did not know whether the creditors had sold him out, but asserted that if there was any surplus derived from such sales it would only go to other creditors who have obtained judgments against him and that he personally would receive none of the proceeds of the sales. Mr. Morse said that the largest amount of bank stock which he formerly owned was hypothecated in a large number of banks through Moseley & Co. He stated that he owed E. J. Berwind \$1,140,000 and that he gave Mr. Berwind \$1,200,000 of Consolidated Steamship stock and his residence in Fifth avenue, all of which, Mr. Morse said, was insufficient to cover his indebtedness to Mr. Berwind. Morse gave other property on Fifth avenue to Moseley & Co. to pay off loans made to him. Mr. Morse said that no member of his family had any property in which he was interested; that he had no claims against anybody; that he never loaned money personally and that he never kept a set of books.

ALLOWED TO KILL ALLIGATORS.

Bill Passed by the Florida House of Representatives. Tallahassee, Fla., May 8.—The Florida House of Representatives has passed the bill allowing the killing of alligators along the Oklawaha river and its tributaries. This bill is intended to protect the hogs on the farms along these streams. The passage of the bill by the House is a great disappointment to the many tourists who frequent this section of Florida and who enjoy watching the "gators in the native homes.

PERSIANS REBEL WARNED.

Russia Tells Them Not to Attack Teheran. Teheran, May 8.—It is rumored that the revolutionists are marching on Teheran and a squadron of Persian Cossacks has been sent to guard an important bridge at Kherazi, thirty miles from Teheran. The Russian legation has dispatched an attaché to meet the revolutionists and warn them to desist in their attempt; otherwise Russia might be forced to take action.

THREE HURT BY BOMB.

Policeman Tried to Throw it Into River, But It Landed on Curbing. New York, May 8.—The explosion of a bomb, hurled into West street by a policeman ignorant of its character caused painful injuries last night to three men, one of them the policeman himself, and threw the neighborhood into a state of wild excitement. The bomb was found in the stable of W. H. Rankin, one of the truckmen involved in the recent strike, and was removed from the building by Patrolman Patrick McMahon, who started for the water front with the idea of throwing it into the river. The throw fell short, however, and the bomb, landing on the edge of the bulkhead curbing, exploded with tremendous force, scattering fragments of trap iron in every direction. McMahon and two stewards of the steamer Celtic, who were standing nearby, were struck by the flying missiles.

TRAIN SNOWBOUND.

Held For a Long Time in Drifts in Colorado. Corona, Col., May 8.—The Denver, Northwestern & Pacific train which left Steamboat Springs last Friday morning for Denver is still snowbound a short distance from the snowsheds west of here. If the line cannot be cleared today, the mail on the train will be taken to Wolcott, Col., by stage and thence to Denver.
