Constantinople, May 11.—The ceremony of girding the sword of Osman upon Mohammed V, the new sultan of Turkey, in succession to Abdul Hamid, occurred yesterday in the Mosque Ayoub, the only sacred edifice in Constantinople which Christians are not allowed to enter.

The function was carried out according to the prearranged program and at its conclusion his majesty started to drive through Stamboul at the head of an imposing procession.

RUSSIAN CABINET TOTTERS
Stolypin, it is Reported, Will Resign

REACTIONARIES STRONG
The Dissolution of the Douma is Likely. Revolution Was Headed Off by the Present Premier.

St. Petersburg, May 11.—A near relative of Premier Stolypin declared yesterday that the retirement of the premier is imminent, as he has resolved to decline the emperor's request that he remain in office.

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The action of the sultan was followed by an outburst of shouting from the people massed beyond the lines of troops, together with a fanfare of trumpets and a rattle of musketry as the soldiers fired a salute, but above all this noise rose sharp and clear the voices of a chorus of school boys chanting Midhat Pasha's hymn of liberty.

NEW RECORD FOR MAURETANIA.
She Has Cut 24 Minutes from Her Time East.

Queenstown, May 11.—The Cunard line steamship Mauretania arrived off Daunt's Rock at 10:54 yesterday morning, having beaten her own previous and all other eastward records by 24 minutes. She would have done still better had she not been delayed by fog off Fastnet. The liner's time from the Ambrose lightship to Daunt's Rock was 4 days, 18 hours and 1 minute. She covered the entire distance, 2,935 knots, at an average speed of 25.70 knots per hour. The best previous average speed eastward was 25.61. From Thursday noon until Sunday noon the steamer ploughed along at the rate of 26.3 knots an hour, constituting a record for three days. In this time she made also a record for a single day's run eastward, 610 knots, as against 600. She made this distance between Friday noon and Saturday noon. The daily runs were 348, 605, 610, 600 and 592.

MISS NORA ISELIN MARRIED.
Is Now the Countess Colaredo-Mannsfeld.

New York, May 11.—The marriage of Miss Nora Iselin, daughter of C. Oliver Iselin of New Rochelle, N. Y., to Count Ferdinand Colaredo-Mannsfeld, an attaché of the Austrian embassy to Italy, took place yesterday afternoon at the home of the bride's uncle, C. O. Iselin, in West Forty-second street.

CLARK FOR WATCHORN'S PLACE.
The Montreal Commissioner May Be Promoted.

Washington, May 11.—John H. Clark, commissioner general of immigration at Montreal, is most likely to be appointed to a like position at the port of New York to succeed Robert Watchorn. This appointment will be agreeable to Senators Root and Dewey, by whom it is expected, but it would directly ignore the wishes of the Republican state organization in New York. Representative Parsons has presented to the president the name of F. W. Whitte, secretary of the New York county committee, and Mr. Whitte is endorsed also by Timothy E. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state committee. Mr. Whitte is a former member of the New York legislature.

ALDRICH AND BEVERIDGE IN TILT ON TARIFF BILL
The Indian Accuses Leader of Not Reading the House Committee Hearings.

Washington, May 11.—When the tariff bill was taken up yesterday Senator Beveridge answered the remarks of Senator Carter on Saturday—in which Mr. Carter dwelt upon the great number of volumes published about the bill, Beveridge had inserted in the record an excerpt from a speech by Senator McCumber, one of the finance committee, delivered on May 3, in which McCumber advocated a commission or bureau to prepare information, and declared that nothing was presented in an accurate or orderly manner. Senator Beveridge also had inserted in the record a statement by Senator Aldrich on May 6, in which Mr. Aldrich declared he had not read the record of the hearing before the House ways and means committee.

Senator Aldrich, in reply, said he referred only to the hearings as to "orange mineral," though the record shows he made the statement in a colloquy with Senator Dooliver about the cotton schedules. He then proceeded to lecture Beveridge.

"I have given thirty years of my life," said he, "to the study of the tariff. I am aware I have not the ability of the senator from Indiana, but if the senator will give a fraction of the time I have given to this matter he will serve his country better than by declaiming about the lack of information on the part of senators."

Senator Heyburn of Idaho, who had the floor, declined to yield further.

TWELVE-TON METEORITE.
To Be Removed from National Forest Reservation.

Seattle, Washington, May 11.—The United States government has given permission to Horace G. Herold, a timber cruiser, residing in Tacoma, to remove from the Washington national forest a huge meteorite, weighing nearly twelve tons. The meteorite was found by Herold in December, 1907. Because he feared the government would not permit him to remove the prize, which is wanted by the Smithsonian institution, he has persistently refused to tell its location. It is supposed to be the largest meteorite in the world. Herold says it is four feet thick, six feet wide and ten feet long.

MAN HOLDS UP STREET CAR.
Gets \$30 from Passengers and Then Escapes.

Milwaukee, May 11.—A street car was held up by a masked robber early yesterday at the entrance of Washington park. He secured \$30. A shot was fired at him, but he escaped. He is supposed to be the man who perpetrated two similar robberies recently, in one wounding the conductor, who resisted.
