HOTEL PREY OF FLAMES

Famous Pemigewasset House at Plymouth, N. H.

WAS DESTROYED BY FIRE


Loss Is Placed at \$100,000—Most of the Furnishings and Fittings Saved by the Employees.

Plymouth, May 13.—The Pemigewasset house, one of the most noted of the summer resort hotels of the state, was destroyed by a fire which broke out shortly after the noon hour yesterday.

The fire caught from the kitchen range and spread rapidly to all parts of the structure. When it was at its height, an appeal for help was sent to Laconia and the department of that city sent a steamer and a force of men.

Fortunately, the direction of the wind was toward the river, and this fact undoubtedly prevented a wider sweep of the flames.

By reason of the location of the fire at the start, the employees of the house, aided by citizens, were able to remove

the larger part of the furnishings and fittings. The hotel was a large wooden structure. On the ground floor were the railroad station, the station offices, the express and telegraph offices, and a very large dining room for the accommodation of passengers on the trains passing through the town.

J. R. Elliott was the manager of the property and he had had a large force of artisans and painters at work for several weeks in getting the hotel in proper condition for the opening of the summer business.

The hotel was erected in 1891-92, to replace the building destroyed by fire in the former year, by the Pemigewasset Hotel company, in which the old Boston, Concord & Montreal road was a large stockholder.

In the last report to the stockholders, the directors of the latter road gave the value of the property at \$83,423.30, but the loss both to the company and to the management will considerably exceed that figure.

There were about 75 guests in the hotel and all were able to leave without difficulty. Nearly all their personal effects were saved.

Former Employees of American Sugar Co. Answer More Charges.

New York, May 13.—The six former employees of the American Sugar Refining company arrested last week on the charges of fraud in connection with the weighing of sugar were arraigned before Judge Hough in the United States court yesterday to plead to two new indictments, charging them with conspiracy to defraud the United States of duties on sugar importations and also of making false entries of weights of sugar. They pleaded not guilty.

The men arraigned were Oliver Spitzer, who was the sugar company's superintendent of docks, and his five assistants, known to the government agents as the "big six."

COTTON PRICES SOARING.

Advance of 28 to 32 Points Yesterday in New York.

New York, May 13.—Amid the most active and excited trading of the present upward movement the price of cotton advanced from 28 to 32 points over the closing quotations of Tuesday night on the New York cotton exchange yesterday. This was equivalent to \$1.40 to \$1.50 per bale.

In the face of enormous selling May contracts advanced to above 11 cents per pound for the first time this year, after closing at 10 7/8 Tuesday night.

Mr. Mary Peck, Widow, Fell From Subway Train and Was Killed.

New York, May 12.—After lying in the morgue all day the body of a woman who either jumped or fell under a subway train at the 116th street station yesterday morning, was identified last night as that of Mrs. Mary Peck, a widow, 70 years old. It is said that she formerly lived in Bridgeport, Conn., where her husband, Henry Peck, was engaged in the carpet manufacturing business. The body was identified by Mrs. Peck's daughter. The daughter soured the idea of suicide, saying that her mother was near sighted and probably had become confused and fallen from the platform.

BOTH GUILTY.

Of Manslaughter in Killing Insane Patient in Boston Farm Asylum.

Boston, May 12.—Roderick McKenzie and Murdoch MacGregor, attendants at the Pierce farm insane asylum, were today found guilty of manslaughter for beating and fatally injuring Richard Mitchell, a patient there. They will be sentenced later.

LAHM ASCENDS.

Signal Corps Lieutenant Sails in War Balloon.

Washington, May 13.—Lieut. Lahm of the United States signal corps yesterday went up in one of the war balloons. He ascended from the local gas works at 11 o'clock and started southward. The weather was ideal for good sailing.

Following Mr. Gallinger, Mr. Simmons (Dem., N. C.) offered an amendment to the window glass schedule of the tariff bill, reducing the rates below those suggested by Senator Cummins in his amendment to the same paragraph on Tuesday.

Washington, May 13.—A touch of humor was introduced into the opening proceedings of the Senate yesterday when Senator Gallinger laid before that body a petition from his constituents in New Hampshire, praying that a reduction of 10 cents a bushel be made in the duty on wheat.

As the title of the petition was read, Mr. Gallinger glanced toward the senators from the wheat growing states, many of whom have figured prominently in the movement for lower duties on the manufactured products of New England. Senators Nelson, Burdett, McCumber and others exchanged significant smiles with the senator from New Hampshire, but no comment was made by any of them.

Mr. Simmons said he did not know whether his rates were the same as those of the Wilson bill, but Mr. Aldrich replied that he had compared them and thought they were almost identical with the rates of the Democratic Wilson act.

PEOPLE DEMAND REVISION

Aldrich May Be Forced to Make Concessions

THAT HE CONTROLS SENATE

Has Been Demonstrated—Finished Bill Must Satisfy President—Senate Modifications Not Likely to Be Important.

Washington, May 13.—The stand-pat leaders are feeling the pressure of public sentiment. They may yield to it in dealing with some of the important tariff schedules. Chairman Aldrich and his finance committee are well aware that the Republican newspapers of the country are disposed to encourage those Republican senators who are fighting for downward revision, and they understand that the President Taft is not satisfied with the way things are doing.

The senator from Rhode Island has demonstrated that his organization is in control in the Senate. The test votes have shown that he has the power to do anything he may wish to do with the various schedules. Having demonstrated that he is in command, he may begin to yield here and there in deference to public sentiment, and because he realizes that the finished bill must be one which President Taft consign without stultifying himself.

Well-informed observers here do not believe Mr. Aldrich intends to yield a great deal, but they do expect to see him and his committee rewrite some of the rates under fire, and they are assured that he will offer amendments to other paragraphs designed to meet objections that have been made. "Yes, we have reason to believe that Mr. Aldrich intends to make some concessions," said one of the so-called insurgent senators yesterday, "but his concessions will not amount to much. And yet we feel that we shall have accomplished a good deal if we compel him to make any concessions at all." The insurgents are going ahead with their preparations for attacks on many of the items of the various schedules regardless of the word quietly passed along that Senator Aldrich is willing to yield here and there.

The attitude of Senator Root has been interpreted in some quarters as a reflection of Taft and as one of the influences leading Senator Aldrich to consider with more respect the demands for reductions. This estimate probably goes too far. The president apparently has no spokesman in the upper branch, while the keen interest shown by Mr. Root in the glass schedule Tuesday was excited only after Mr. Cummins had hammered away all day with facts and figures intended to show that the rates on window glass are too high. If the rates are reduced the victory belongs to the insurgency of Mr. Cummins, although the aid Senator Root may have given is entitled also to credit. Persons following the tariff debate will notice that in addition to the charge that the farmers are largely responsible for high prices, the old guard now has added the insinuation that most of the profits made possible by the high tariff have been gobbled by the jobber and the retailer. This allegation does not dovelait very well with the well known fact that in many lines, notably groceries, tobacco, furniture, etc., the middleman has been almost wiped out, through the combinations effected by the manufacturers and their policy of selling direct to the consumer. The Senate Tuesday bristled with charges against the selling houses, but the recent history of trade proves that they are growing fewer every year and that at prices to the ultimate consumer have been going up correspondingly, owing in part to the elimination of competition.

St. Petersburg, May 13.—The Douma Tuesday passed the second reading of the bill modifying the administration of the Pacific coast territories and the island of Sakhalin. During the course of the debate both the supporters and the opponents of the bill protested against the pre-emption of property and the exploitation of territory in this region by foreigners, especially the Japanese and Americans. The Douma also adopted the measure providing for extraordinary military expenditures amounting to \$40,000,000.

Relief Over Stolypin's Retention.

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Eleven prisoners made an attempt to break jail at Vilkomir, Lithuania, Tuesday, while the building was being inspected. They attacked and killed two wardens and made a dash for liberty. They were pursued by the guard, and two of them were killed. Several others were wounded, and the rest captured.

NO "JIM CROW" SIGHTSEERS.

Automobiles Must Take Negroes in New York.

New York, May 13.—The supreme court here Tuesday decided that the proprietors of sightseeing automobiles in this state may not draw the color line among their passengers, and that any attempt to establish the "Jim Crow" idea in public conveyances of this character is illegal. The court granted damages of \$100 to Estelle Green, a negro who was refused a seat on one of the cars operated by a local tourist company.
