BOUND FOR ENGLAND.

Wright and the Kindrates Depart From Montreal.

Montreal, May 12.—Florence Kindrate, her mother, and C. Montrose Wright, all of whom figured in the recent investigation of the murder of Ethel Kinrade, in Hamilton, Ont., left Sherbrook, Que., Tuesday night, on a Boston and Maine train for Boston, bound, it is believed, for Portland, Me., where they will take ship for England. They were held up for an hour at Newport, Vt., while American immigration officers satisfied themselves that there was no legal obstacle to their admission. It is reported that they are under surveillance.

The coroner's jury after an exhaustive examination of Miss Kinrade, returned a verdict that Ethel Kinrade had been murdered by "persons unknown to the jury."

The question of taking further action in the case is now before the provincial cabinet and it is expected it will give it consideration at today's meeting.

ACCIDENTAL DROWNING.

Verdict Rendered in Case of Norman H. Morrill.

Franklin, N. H., May 12.—A verdict of accidental drowning was returned last night at the conclusion of a hearing conducted by County Solicitor Thos. P. Clifford, before Medical Referee G. P. Conn of Concord, in the case of Norman H. Morrill, whose body was found today floating in the Johnson grist mill pond.

Morrill was 22 years old. He disappeared on April 10 and no clue to his whereabouts was obtained until yesterday when his father and sister discovered the body in the water.

BETRAYED SECRET POLICE.

Former Director of St. Petersburg Police Was Convicted Today.

St. Petersburg, May 12.—M. Loupukhin, former director of the secret police was convicted today of belonging to a criminal association, and was sentenced to five years in prison. The case must approve of the sentence. His offense consisted of betraying Eugene Azes, a valuable member of the secret police to a terrorist organization.

And Brings Down a Bull Giraffe—Roosevelt Visits Mission.

Nairobi, B. E. A., May 12.—Messages from Mackos say that Kermit Roosevelt killed a bull giraffe yesterday. Roosevelt left today to visit the American mission, a day's march from the railroad. Tomorrow the party will break camp, going to McMillan's Juba ranch where they will remain till May 20, then leave for the real interior.

CLING TO ROPE IN RIVER.

Three Girls and a Man Rescued After Canoe Is Overturned.

Rumford Falls, Me., May 12.—The facts concerning the rescue of four young people after they had been upset from a canoe in the Androscooggin river became known yesterday.

Helen Hutchins, Miss Moody and Miss Abbott wished to cross the river from Rumford Corner to Rumford Point, Tuesday night, and as the ferryboat had made its last trip for the night, the ferryman, William Barker, agreed to take them across in a canoe. The river was filled with logs from the spring drive, and at almost freshet pitch. When halfway across the canoe was overturned by the logs.

The Hutchins and Abbott girls and Barker obtained a hold on the ferry rope which was stretched across the river, but Miss Moody drifted down the

stream, clinging to the canoe. She was fast approaching the rapids when she was rescued by Scott Martin, who put off in a boat.

The three young people clung to the ferry rope for fully 20 minutes, being bumped and bruised by the logs, until Mr. Martin reached them.

FIRE LOSS OF \$20,000.

Blaze at Waterville Destroys Maine Central Repair Shops.

Waterville, Me., May 12.—Fire last night caused a loss of \$20,000 to the Maine Central railroad. The blaze was in the repair shops, and the portion occupied by the upholstery and eash and blind painting departments was a total loss.

The fire lasted an hour, but burned fiercely while it lasted.
