REPORT ON OUR TAXATION

England Getting City Land Assessments

MUCH INTEREST IN EFFECT

On Real Estate Transactions—Czar to Meet Kaiser in Gulf of Finland, Money Not Yet Raised to Buy Holbein Portrait.

London, June 3.—The government on Tuesday night issued a parliamentary paper, elaborate consular reports obtained at the request of Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, on the taxation of land values in New York, Boston, San Francisco and Cleveland. The reports cover the amount of taxation, the methods of levying it and the effect on real estate transactions. They will be read with the greatest interest here in connection with the proposed new taxes, and doubtless were obtained for Chancellor Lloyd-George's guidance in framing the budget.

HOLBEIN PRICE NOT RAISED.

Picture Britain Is Afraid of Losing Is Still in the National Gallery.

London, June 3.—Crowds of the curious stand daily before Holbein's portrait of Christina, Duchess of Milan, in the National Gallery, wondering how soon it will go to America, which is now regarded as its ultimate destination. The period of option subscriptions are nowhere near the purchasing price, which is fixed at \$350,000, and it was expected that Colnaghi & Co., who paid \$350,000 to the Duke of Norfolk for the famous painting, would remove it before the gallery closed Tuesday night. However, it is still hanging in its accustomed place, and Sir Charles Holyrod, director of the gallery, although he confessed he has no information on the subject, seemed hopeful that another period of delay would be granted.

ALLIANCE FRANCAISE CELEBRATES

Work of Exchange Professors Abroad Is Enlarged.

Paris, June 3.—The Alliance Francaise Tuesday celebrated its twenty-fifth anniversary at the Sorbonne. M. Loubet, the former president of France, presided. Paul Deschane reviewed the work of the association in the propagation of the French language and ideals abroad. He eulogized the work of the exchange professor in the United States, giving credit to James Hazen Hyde for the initiative in this direction. At the same time he protested against the fact that of 15,000 teachers of French in America, only 500 were French. Mr. Hyde was elected a member of the board of administration.

CHINESE FEUD CONTINUES.

Many Men Engaged in Intermine War Near City of Amoy.

Amoy, China, June 3.—The fighting among the clans in the Heuwah district, 65 miles north of here, continues. The Lim clan recently raided a village. Reprisals and bloodshed are expected. The Lim clan is the strongest faction in the district, and includes thirty villages and 5,000 men. The four weaker clans have united to resist their aggression. This trouble among the clans of the Heuwah territory began three years ago because of the abduction of a bride, and has continued intermittently ever since.

CZAR TO MEET THE KAISER.

The Letter to Give This Month to the Gulf of Finland.

St. Petersburg, June 3.—The Novoe Vremya yesterday said that Emperor William and Emperor Nicholas will meet in the waters of the Finnish gulf on June 17. Emperor William will arrive on board the imperial yacht Hohenzollern and join the Russian imperial family. Shortly after the visit the emperor of Russia and his wife and children will start on their summer cruise in the Finnish archipelago.

Revolution Suppressed.

Washington, June 3.—A dispatch to the state department from Santo Domingo says that the revolution at Mont Christi has been suppressed.

Flood in the Ottawa.

Montreal, Que., June 3.—The Ottawa river is in flood, the water not having been so high for the past thirty-three years, when the great flood occurred. More than 10,000 men are out of work, almost all the steamboats and freight boats are tied up, lumber mills are closed and there is general havoc at all the small towns along both banks.

Italy's King to Visit.

Paris, June 3.—The Gaulois states that the king of Italy will visit England in August and Germany in September.

ON FRIDAY NEXT.

Mr. Robinson Must Make Answer to Contempt Charge.

New York, June 3.—Sanford Robinson, an director of the United Copper company and counsel for F. Augustus Heinze, its president, yesterday was given until Friday next to answer to the charge of contempt of court made against him by United States District Attorney Wise Tuesday. Judge Lacombe in the United States circuit court, granted the adjournment on the application of counsel for Mr. Robinson, who said he needed time to consult with the counsel.

His accusation against Mr. Robinson is a development in an attempt of District Attorney Wise to obtain possession of the books of the United Copper company for use in proceedings against F. Augustus Heinze. David Baglin, vice-president of the company, testified before the federal grand jury Tuesday that he heard Mr. Robinson and Arthur F. Heinze discussing the removal of the company's books from its office after the books had been subpoenaed by the court.

FRIENDSHIP TO AMERICA

Result of Visit of Japanese Squadron

GRATIFICATION IS SHOWN

In the Tokio Newspapers—Japan Is Also Very Close to England—Great Pains Taken by Former to Solidify Alliance.

Tokio, June 3.—Government officials, the Japanese newspapers and the public generally are highly gratified over the splendid report given Rear Admiral Ijichi and the Japanese training squadron at Tacoma, accounts of which have been published in the leading papers. The report of the Japanese cadets and sailors in Tacoma and other cities on the Pacific coast is regarded in all circles as unimpeachable evidence of the sincerity of the friendship between Japan and America.

ENGLAND AND JAPAN CLOSE.

Letter Showing Proofs of The Solidarity of The Alliance.

London, June 3.—The Times publishes a telegram from its Tokio correspondent railing with the history of the Fukuoka railway dispute, with a view to showing that this involves no loss of friendship or of strength in the alliance between Great Britain and Japan. The despatch says that both the Tokio and Fukuoka correspondents have been engaged in discussing various questions with the Japanese ministers, and have been received in audience by the Japanese emperor, and that everywhere they received the strongest proofs of the solidarity of the alliance.

SEIZED GOWNS ON SALE.

Finery Worth \$50,000 Goes Under Hammer.

New York, June 3.—A novel sale of women's gowns, all the latest Parisian cut, was begun here yesterday by the government of the United States in the role of salesman. The accumulation of finery which was being smuggled into the country and was seized by customs inspectors in March and April is estimated to be worth \$50,000. The sale was by auction, under the direction of United States Marshall Henkel and brought a large attendance of women who expressed the greatest admiration at the display that was spread out in one of the upper rooms of the customs house. The goods consisted mainly of women's clothing of the quality and delicate workmanship, including upwards of two hundred gowns, many of them beautifully embroidered and trimmed with high-priced lace.

FOURTH TRAIN-ROBBER CAUGHT.

Other Three Are Arraigned in Federal Court in Omaha.

Denver, June 3.—James Shelton, believed by the police to be the fourth member of the band of robbers who recently held up a Union Pacific passenger train near Omaha, Neb., was arrested here early yesterday. Shelton, according to the police, came to Denver several days ago, has been trying to raise funds for the defence of the three men now under arrest at Omaha. Shelton will be taken to Omaha immediately.

AMERICANS AT VANCOUVER CHARGED WITH ATTACK UPON OFFICERS.

Vancouver, B. C., June 3.—E. R. Kinman and F. L. Garley, Americans, the latter a capitalist from New York, are in jail without bail as the result of a fight with the police Tuesday. They represent a syndicate which purports to erect an amusement park on Dead Man's Island, which the city claims is a part of the public domain. The New Yorkers claim the island under a lease of the Dominion government granted 11 years ago.

FREE FROM SUSPICION.

Charles Barr Has Been Released in Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 3.—Charles Barr, a Los Angeles brick mason, who was arrested Tuesday night on suspicion of knowing something about the murder of Laura Register in Providence, R. I., was freed from all suspicion in that direction yesterday.

Barr was trying to sell a bracelet to a pawn broker to obtain money to attend a prize fight when arrested. It is said by the officers that the bracelet has been identified as one worn by Miss Register when she was murdered.

ENGLAND WANTS MORE ISLANDS.

An Expedition Looks for Some in the Antarctic.

Victoria, B. C., June 3.—To look for islands believed to exist, and plant the British flag on each, is the business of which the exploring steamer, Nimrod, which took Lieutenant Shackleton's expedition to the Antarctic, has sailed from Sydney, according to a dispatch received by the steamer Maturra. Lieutenant Shackleton says the present cruise is to complete the Antarctic work by a search in the sub-arctic for several islands, the existence of which is doubtful. Man has never set foot on Emerald, Nimrod or Doherty islands, which Captain J. P. Davis, now commander of the Nimrod, is to seek. Professor David, who accompanied the late Shackleton expedition, reports that analysis of the specimens show the existence of radium in the Antarctic.

HITCHCOCK AND MACK TO FIGURE IN CANAL LABEL

Government to Call Them as to Warning Given to Reporters.

Indianapolis, June 3.—The Panama label case against the owners of the Indianapolis News was continued yesterday in the federal court until Oct. 11 to give the government opportunity to produce as witnesses Frank Hitchcock and Norman E. Mack, certain members of the office force of J. F. Morgan and certain government officials in Washington.

It is the purpose of the lawyers to show that Messrs. Hitchcock and Mack had warned reporters in the Chicago party headquarters that the intimations contained in a cable despatch to the Chicago News that an American syndicate had corruptly gained a profit of \$28,000,000 in the sale of the Panama Canal to the United States were without foundation in fact.

Members of J. F. Morgan's staff were to be summoned, counsel stated, to show the receipts the company gave to the United States for \$40,000,000, the purchase price of the canal, and the receipts given by the French companies for the payment for the securities sold to the United States.

ZEPPELIN REACHES HOME.

Airship Completes Trip to Friedrichshafen.

Friedrichshafen, June 3.—The Zeppelin airship, after having made its way by easy stages from Goepfingen, arrived here at six o'clock yesterday morning and descended successfully to the floating shed on the lake of Constance. The damage sustained at the end of the prolonged flight of Sunday and Monday will be repaired here.

HOLBEN SAVED TO ENGLAND?

The Picture Fund of \$350,000 Raised.

London, June 3.—According to an evening newspaper the money necessary to secure Holbein's portrait of Christina, Duchess of Milan, for the nation, has been provided by a wealthy west country art lover. Apart from the government's contribution of \$50,000, public subscriptions have amounted to only \$80,000. Consequently the philanthropist who has come to the rescue has had to provide \$320,000 to make up the price of \$350,000.

The famous Holbein portrait of Christina of Denmark had been loaned by the Duke of Norfolk to the national gallery for twenty-eight years. It was recently sold by the Duke for \$305,000, in an art dealer, but with the understanding that the nation might purchase it within a month for \$350,000. The national gallery has no resources, and an appeal was made to the public to prevent the picture leaving the country. It is supposed to have been bought by the art dealer for an American client.

SHEA ADMITTED TO BAIL.

Woman He Stabbed in New York Is on Road to Recovery.

New York, June 3.—When the announcement was made yesterday by the hospital authorities that Alice Walsh, formerly of Chicago, was on the sure road to recovery from the wounds which Cornelius P. Shea, formerly president of the teamsters' union, is alleged to have inflicted upon her, Shea was taken from the prison where he had been confined and admitted to bail in the sum of \$3,000. Miss Walsh was stabbed a score or more times on May 23 and Shea was arrested, charged with the crime and held without bail pending the outcome of the woman's injuries which for a time it was feared would prove fatal.

TRACE OF TREASURE SHIP.

Dredgers May Have Found One in Delaware River.

Chester, Pa., June 3.—Government officials are agitated over the discovery of an obstruction in the Delaware river in the vicinity of Fort Mifflin, which, they think, may prove to be a treasure ship which went down in 1812. It is known that there is a boat at the bottom of the river at that point and that war equipment of value, as well as gold and silver, are still confined within the hold of the ship.

While the government boat Cataract was working in the vicinity Tuesday, the suction pump became clogged, and when it was brought to the surface it was found to contain several fancy and costly helmets, such as were worn by the English soldiers, and equipments of other description. This discovery has led to the belief that it is one of the boats of the English government which brought gold to this country to pay its soldiers during the war of 1812, and which was sunk at this point. For the purpose of bringing the boat to the surface, the Hell Gate, which has been dredging the river off this city, will be sent to Fort Mifflin.
