BURGLAR ALARM IN THE CURTAIN. Invention of Dresden Man Passes Muster With the Police in Berlin. Washington, June 5.—A new and simple kind of burglar alarm has been invented by a Dresden engineer, according to a report from Deputy Consul-General Bywater. Mr. Bywater says it has been thoroughly tested by the police authorities of Dresden and Berlin, and the most experienced criminal experts were unable to find flaws in the apparatus or to enter the protected premises without starting the alarm. The appliance itself is extremely simple, consisting of a curtain or portiere, wired with fine conductors. At certain places on the curtain are affixed small metal knobs, which are connected with the wire conductors. The curtain is then drawn across the window or door or around the safe, and the slightest disturbance of this position immediately breaks the circuit, as the metal knobs are thrown out of contact with each other. Should the burglars notice the wires and cut one or several thereof, the breaking of the circuit would not start the alarm. Any other attempt to destroy the protecting curtain would also be noticed. Any curtain, unless made of fire-proof material, would also act as a fire alarm. The alarm itself may consist of a series of bells, lights, or other electrical appliances. The invention in question can be used to protect doors, windows, safes, etc., and naturally the curtains, forming the most conspicuous part of the device, can be designed and arranged to suit the individual taste. Mr. Bywater says the inventor recently gave him an exhibition of the working of the apparatus, and he got the impression that this invention is unique in simplicity and reliance.

Graduation at Swanton High School. The graduation exercises of the Swanton high school began with the sermon to the senior class by the Rev. C. D. Pierce Sunday evening in the Congregational church. Wednesday afternoon in the high school room, there was an exhibition of work done by the several grades. An interesting program of recitations, drills, singing and pantomimes was also given. This session was largely attended by the parents and interested patrons. The graduating exercises of the grammar room were held yesterday afternoon. Last evening the graduating class of the high school held its exercises in Bullard's hall. The class is unusually small, consisting of three members, Miss Lulu Corlies, Donald McIver, and James Loop. The hall was tastefully arranged for the occasion, the class motto, "The end crowns the work," in letters of gold on a background of green, graced the proscenium arch. The graduates acquitted themselves with honor and were freely applauded. Music was furnished by the orchestra, directed by Mrs. Lulu Corlies. After the exercises, the usual informal reception was held.

History of Watahsaid, Vermont. "This excellently written history published for the author by Geo. E. Littlefield, Boston, has just come from the press. It is a most readable and very readable account of the town from the date of its charter, in 1782, to 1908, together with genealogies of Watahsaid families. The book is an octavo volume of 832 pages, printed on fine rag paper, especially recommended for durability, and strongly bound in cloth, with gilt top and front edges uncut. It contains a map of the territory, a reproduction of the earliest extant plan of the town, plans of the early meeting-houses, and several half-tone illustrations. Practically three-fifths of the book is devoted to genealogical records, which will be valuable not only to former residents and their descendants, but to all interested in the genealogies of the various families mentioned. In some respects this is one of the best histories of a Vermont town that has been published. The preservation of material relating to local history is a matter particularly within the province of the public librarian, and every publication of this nature ought to be hailed with pleasure by librarians of the state and act as a stimulus to bring about the issue of other works of a similar kind.

IT'S ON THE WAY. The Terrible Monster Neil Murray Saw in Southern Seas. Boston, June 5.—Chief Officer Neil Murray of the steamship Mareldio, from Buenos Ayres and other ports, gives this description of a monster he saw in the southern seas on the way from Renarch to Santos: "I don't know what it was, but it was a great moving fish or animal. It appeared to be as big as a whale, and the commotion it made in the water led me to believe that it was propelling itself by enormous claws. I could not see its head, only one bulky coil that projected above the water. But the water was in turmoil for nearly 300 feet, which disclosed its length. The part of the leviathan that was visible was dark green in color, with heavy scales not unlike in appearance to the hide of an alligator. A saw-like ridge extended along the back and I should judge the body of the monster was fully as large around as a whale."
