MADE SUCCESSFUL FLIGHT

Orville Wright Kept Aeroplane in the Air Over Five Minutes.

Washington, July 13.—Orville Wright last evening made a very successful flight in the Wright aeroplane at Fort Meyer, Va., remaining in the air five minutes and 30 seconds during which time the machine attained the exceptional speed of about 40 miles an hour.

After keeping a crowd of nearly a thousand expectant people, including a number prominent in official life, waiting for an hour and a half on account of unfavorable wind conditions, the aeroplane started on its flight at 7:07 p. m.

GREAT FLIGHT MADE IN FRANCE TO-DAY

M. Bleriot Went 23 Miles Straight Away in 56 Minutes Winning a Prize of \$2,800.
