

WILL BE NO STRIKE.

Chicago Street Railroads Offer to Increase Pay Within a Year.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 13.—The crucial point in the dispute between the officials of the street railway lines of Chicago and the 19,000 employees was passed yesterday. By the offer of a maximum scale of 30 cents an hour to be paid by August 1, 1911, which was made by President John M. Roach of the North and West side lines and the prompt acceptance of the same by President William Quinn of the North and West side street car men's union, all possibility of a strike appears to be over.
