ABOUT THE STATE Gov. Prouty seems to have had luck with automobiles. A tire broke Saturday night which prevented him from catching the sleeper at Middlebury after a few days' stop at Lake Dunmore. Complaint was made out Saturday afternoon against Robert Selwyn, chauffeur for Huntington Smith in Castleton. He was arrested and fined \$10 for speeding. The authorities say that more arrests will follow. Three horses were killed by the human office at Newport last week. They belonged to Homer Bank of Fraburg, Bert Clifford of Coventry and Clair Gier of Newford. All three pleaded guilty to cruelty to animals and were fined \$10 each.

THE ROADS OF MOROCCO. The Tribes Plough Them up Now and Then and Sow Grain on Them. There are two roads from Tangier to Fez, the one passing through Alcazar and the other following the seashore via Larache. The former is the more direct and except during the rainy season is usually chosen by the traveler, but the beach road to Larache possesses many attractions and you are able to spend a night at the old Portuguese settlement of Arzila, which is a model of the fortifications of two centuries ago.

No one has ever yet measured accurately the exact distance which separates Tangier from Fez, and I hope the next person to make the journey will take a bicycle wheel with a cyclometer attached to settle the vexed question once and for all. Roughly I put the distance at 185 to 190 miles, and it is usual to take from six to eight days on the road, but during the hot months of summer, five miles, which is quite sufficient if you want to shoot on arriving in camp. The journey can be done comfortably in six days if your animals are not too heavily loaded, and I have ridden from Fez to Larache in three days during the heat of August, but it is an experiment not to be recommended.

Except during the months of July, August and September the climate of Morocco is temperate and pleasant. The heavy spring rains, however, the best season for a journey, as the tropical rains which are likely to overwhelm you in the late autumn and early winter have ceased. The rivers are serious obstacles during the rainy season, as there are no bridges and no ferries except close to the coast, and consequently if the roads are impracticable you are likely to be hung up on the banks of a river for a very considerable time. The rivers are wide and shallow, but are liable to rise and fall eight to eight feet in twenty-four hours. Your baggage must be carried on mules or horses. There are no regular roads in Morocco and the tracks are often very difficult to trace and vary constantly because the tribes have the curious custom of ploughing right over the tracks and sowing their grain thereon. This in the summer when the corn is ripe the old road has sometimes entirely disappeared and it is necessary to strike a new trail. As there are no roads carts are unknown in the interior. The only wheeled vehicles which ever found their way to Fez were brought there by the late Sultan Abdul Aziz, who succeeded in adding considerable to his unpopularity by the introduction of the automobile.

TIN OUTPUT IN 1908. Report by the United States Geological Survey. The production of tin in the United States continued practically nonexistent in 1908, according to an advance chapter of the United States geological survey's annual volume on the mineral resources of the United States. A few tons of stream tin sluiced from gravel in Seward peninsula, Alaska, constituted the entire output. Several small deposits of lead in the Straits Settlements, Alaska, and some work along similar lines is being done in South Dakota and in Texas, but no production was made. In Washington and the Carolinas no work is reported.

QUARTZ AND FELDSPAR. Production in 1908 Reported by United States Geological Survey. Although nearly every producer of quartz for commercial purposes in the United States reported unfavorable market conditions and decreased production for 1908, as compared with 1907, there was an increase in the total quantity produced from 39,192 short tons in 1907 to 47,216 short tons in 1908. Edson S. Bastin, author of a report on the production of quartz and feldspar in the "Mineral resources" series of the United States geological survey, attributes this increase to the new accessions to the list of producers. The total value of the product, however, was less in 1908, being \$1,097,157, as compared with \$223,801 in 1907.

Quartz is the most abundant of all minerals, occurs in a great variety of forms, and has many different uses, the principal ones being in the manufacture of wood filler, pottery, paints, and scouring soaps. Massive quartz, crushed and graded to various degrees of fineness, is used in making sandpaper, sand belts, with sandblast apparatus, etc. Within recent years crystalline quartz has been used as a source of silicon and in the manufacture of alloys of silicon with iron and copper. The great affinity of silicon for oxygen renders it useful as a deoxidizer in many of the metal industries.


The feldspar trade, like most others, suffered severely from the panic of 1907-8. In 1908 the total production of feldspar was 70,474 short tons, valued at \$428,553, compared with 91,799 short tons, worth \$588,944 in 1907. Killing The Salmon. Ten thousand people are in the salmon-catching business. The season is short and the harvest is said to be uncertain. The salmon run, as it is called—the plunge of the mating pairs of the nesting grounds far up streams from the sea, lasts from two to three weeks only. Yet four to five million cases, each containing forty-eight one-pound cans, are packed annually, with forty-two million dollars of fish, and the market value of the produce is twenty-eight million dollars. There are two hundred canning plants along the Pacific coast from California to Alaska and so many thousands of snarers for the tiny victims that new corners in the trade actually have difficulty to find places in which to dump their own decays.

It is a short time they have and the work is fast and furious, and has in it all the ruthlessness of other such killings. The fish must be dressed and canned while they are fresh and firm, and the speed to handle at the canneries the huge lakes of the multitude of fishermen must be great. The hands of men are too slow for the work. Even special ladders—and there were multitudes of them a very few years since—in the art of cleaning fish are useless. A short time ago, thousands of Chinese employed in the canneries, who did nothing else and knew almost nothing else but to wield the knife, the scum, the salmon, worked with almost incredible skill to keep pace with the supply.
