

STRIKE MAKES PLANT CLOSE

Weavers Walked Out of Borden's Mills at Fall River

IT CLOSES WHOLE PLANT

Weavers Wanted Ten Per Cent. Raise in Wages Because Quality of Material Made the Work More Difficult.

Fall River, Mass., Sept. 13.—As the result of the strike of the weavers, seven print cloth mills of the Iron Mills Works company here closed down to-day for the first time in twenty-three years.

When the mills opened this morning the weavers marched to their hall, where the situation was discussed. The weavers demanded a ten per cent. increase in wages, owing to the fact that the poor condition of the yarn makes it more difficult to weave.

MILLS RE-OPEN.

A milkman found the three children lying in a bloody heap this morning. Fannie Infusino said that she and her baby brother and Teresa were playing yesterday when an unknown man approached them and induced them to follow him to a group of trees in St. Agnes cemetery, near the culvert where they were found this morning.

Fannie said that without a word the man shot Teresa and stood watching her die. Then he shot her little brother and then herself, afterwards fleeing.
