

# RANGERS KEEP THE TROPHY

## Defeated Hardwick Challengers, 3 to 2, Saturday IN AN EXCITING MATCH

### Home Team Had Everything Its Own Way in First Half But Visitors Braced up in Second, Although Not Enough to Win.

A crowd of 300 people witnessed a close and exciting association football game and a handicap mile race at the Rangers grounds Saturday afternoon. The football game was between the Barre Rangers and the Hardwick teams for the Scampini cup. The Rangers won the game by a score of 3 to 2 and will retain for another year the cup which they have held for the past two years.

The mile race was won easily by William Smith, the well known local runner. There were four starters in the race, handicapped as follows: Smith, scratch; Buzzi, 100 yards; Phillips, 75 yards; Porelli, 65 yards. The runners had to circle the field seven times for the mile and Smith who started 100 yards behind the leading runner passed the bunch on the fourth lap and won out in 4 minutes and 59 seconds. Porelli finished second, ten yards behind Smith. Phillips dropped out after the fourth lap and Buzzi finished third, half a lap behind the first two. A purse of \$5, \$3 and \$2 was given to the first three.

The football game consisted of two forty-five minute halves and in the first half the Rangers had everything practically their own way, scoring two goals and cutting out the visitors. But in the second half Hardwick braced up and soon had the score tied, 2 to 2. However, this was the best they could do, while the Rangers squeaked in another goal five minutes before the game ended.

Both goals for the Rangers in the first half were made by Duguid. The first goal was made in the first five minutes of play, when Duguid kicked it between the posts after the team had rushed it the length of the field. The second goal was made on a penalty kick when Hardwick fouled ten yards in front of goal. Duguid made a pretty kick which shot by the keeper just inside one of the posts.

This ended the scoring for the first half and at the opening of the last half Hardwick started in with a rush and in the first minutes of play Spence scored a goal for the visitors. After thirty minutes more of play, Brown booted the ball through the goal for the last score of the visitors. The Rangers then took a brace and after rushing the ball down the field to the goal, J. Freedland kicked it through for the winning score. The line up of the teams:

## MEXICAN UNREST GOOD SIGN.

Dr. Rowe Says It Shows People Are Progressing Politically. New York, Sept. 20.—Dr. I. S. Rowe of the university of Pennsylvania, chairman of the American delegation to the recent Pan-American congress, arrived today on the steamer Mexico from Vera Cruz, after an extended tour of Mexico, during which he made a study of the political organization of the country and the present political situation.

"The agitation and political unrest throughout Mexico," said Dr. Rowe, "far from being an indication of approaching revolution, is in reality a sign of real political progress. For the first time in the history of the country one of the highest elective offices—that of vice-president—is being made the subject of public discussion. This awakening of the people to a sense of civic obligation and to an appreciation of their political power, far from being an indication of a reversion to the troublous times that preceded the presidency of Gen. Diaz, is the best guarantee that the Mexican people are now being rapidly prepared for the maintenance of a stable government on a far more democratic basis than has hitherto been possible."

Besides the Old Men There Are About Fifteen New Candidates, Who Are Showing up Well Under Coach Turner.

Northfield, Sept. 20.—The prospects for a good football team at Norwich university this fall are better than they have been in previous years. The new material in the freshman class is very promising. There are, beside the old men of last year, about 15 new candidates, all with foot ball records. Some of the men are Butler of Middletown high, Foss, quarter back three years on Portland high; Twitchell, full back on Portland high; Alvord, of Greenfield high; Burch, of North Adams high; Kelly, full back on Stoneham high; Putman, Stantton military academy; Murray of Lynn, three years quarter back at Exeter; Lee of Fordham; Underhill, captain of Bellows Falls high; and Ver Wiebe, Somerville high, brother of the famous Harvard full back. James Turner has been engaged again as coach for the third year and his work will materially strengthen the work of the team. The season opens on next Saturday with Holy Cross at Worcester, and a good game is expected.

### Chiaradonna of Bethel Scored on a Goal from the Field.

The Montpelier seminary football team played its first game on Saturday with the Bethel high school team as its opponents. The seminary won easily, 17 to 3, using straight football, with scarcely any forward passes at open work being tried out. The boys from the hill demonstrated that they have a formidable line this year, notwithstanding the fact that some of their men are green and will require a large amount of coaching before they are licked into the desired shape.

The star man for the Bethel bunch was Chiaradonna, of wrestling fame in Barre, and it was he who saved them from being whitewashed entirely, by making a field goal from the 35-yard line. Aside from this, the Bethel aggression was hardly ever within striking distance of the seminary goal.

## CLYDE LINER HELPLESS.

### Picked Up By Southbound Steamer and Passengers Removed.

New York, Sept. 20.—The Clyde liner Comanche, which sailed from here on Saturday for Charleston and Jacksonville, sent a message last night from the sea to the United Wireless people saying that a 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon she picked up alone ten miles south of Cape Hatteras, the Clyde liner Carib, disabled and helpless, bound from Wilmington, N. C., for this port, with several passengers, and took her in tow. The Hawser parted and the Carib anchored. The Comanche set her wireless asking for assistance and the revenue cutter Yamacraw, which was in the neighborhood of the Delaware breakwater but was about 300 miles away, headed at once for the Carib, and will probably reach her in the morning, as the Carib being in no danger, the Comanche proceeded and her wireless said the Carib's machinery was disabled.

The proceeds will enable the Western Union company to liquidate a considerable part of its existing debt, and will provide for a long term of years the necessary funds for improvement and construction purposes."
