

IS TAFT'S OLD "SWEETHEART" Mrs. Hodge Says They Were Only "Friends."

North Yakima, Wash., Oct. 4.—Yielding to the pressure of interviewers, Mrs. H. E. Hodge of North Yakima, to whom President Taft referred as "an old sweetheart of mine" in his address here, has told the story of that early romance. "Mr. Taft and I grew up as children together in Cincinnati," she said, "and from our earliest days we were very good friends and very dear friends. In no sense of the term we were sweethearts, though most people have put an unfortunate interpretation upon the word the president used. Mr. Taft was never engaged to anyone until he became betrothed to Mrs. Taft and I was never engaged to him nor was there ever any idea of our getting married."

"Our parents went to Mr. Livermore's Unitarian church and Mr. Taft and I moved in the same circles. In fact, we were very good friends and look a deep interest in each other and the president attended my wedding, but only as a friend."

"When Mr. Taft reached Yakima I went to see him and invited me into his private car and introduced me to some Washington friends as 'an old sweetheart.' I had no idea he was going to mention it on the platform. While I was there the committee came for him to go on his drive, but he asked them for a few minutes more, again speaking of me as 'an old sweetheart.'"

Free Scholarships Available in Philadelphia School for Nurses.

Philadelphia, the city of brotherly love, has an exhibition of practical benevolence in the work of the Philadelphia school for nurses which is of surpassing interest to everyone interested in the care of the sick, the education of nurses and the promotion of public health and sanitation.

The annual report showed that during the past year, ten thousand, two hundred and seventy-five patients were supplied with nurses, who otherwise could not have secured skilled nursing care. Four-fifths of this service was rendered gratuitously. It was shown also that in teaching facilities, available workers and number of students, the school ranks as the largest school for nurses in the world.

Clara Barton, the world renowned nurse and manager of field hospital work and organizer of the Red Cross society, having for many years observed the efficient work of the Philadelphia school for nurses, recently invited Dr. Eugene Underhill, founder of the institution, to visit her, and present at a conference in her summer home in Oxford, Mass., for the purpose of considering the advisability of reproducing the work in the larger New England cities.

At a public reception, representatives from Lowell, Salem, Worcester, Springfield, Bridgeport, New Haven, Providence and other manufacturing centers, called attention to the need of such a school for their respective cities.

Several large classes of students are about to be enrolled in the Philadelphia school for nurses, who will, doubtless, witness the extension of the work of the institution in accordance with plans now developing as a result of the recent New England conference. A large number of free two-year scholarships are available to young women throughout the entire country, preference being given to those who live in the smaller towns and cities, and the rural districts. Those scholarships include room, board, laundry, uniforms, all necessary instruction, and railroad fare paid to the student's home town upon the completion of the course. A preparatory home study course and a preparatory school course are also available to those who desire to quickly prepare themselves for self-study, but are unable to devote two-years to study.
