RENOVATING AN OLD ORCHARD.
Dynamite for Old Trees—Then a Scraper for the Good Ones, and Then the Spray and Manure.

If one is the possessor of a very old orchard, or one that is considerably run down, it would probably be more satisfactory and cheaper in the end to wipe it out of existence and begin anew. We can form some idea of the conditions of the trees by the tops, but the roots are an unknown element. We never know what is going on below the surface until we have dug down. However, if one thinks that he would like to renovate that orchard, he wants first to get through and take out all trees that are past redemption, trees that have the canker or are so nearly gone that they will not pay to leave them, says William Underwood in the Indiana Farmer.

In removing the old trees, blowing them out with dynamite will be found much cheaper and better than grubbing them out. In fitting them to blow out, just as much of the main body of the tree should be left as possible. The big limbs should be cut off close to the trunk and the trunk left about four or five feet high. Then when the charge of dynamite is placed underneath it, the tree will split and in that way lose half the effect of the charge. About two one-half sticks of dynamite are enough to use, and the hole should be bored in the soil so that it will come just as near under the center of the trunk of the tree as possible. It is not best to go any deeper than necessary in order to get under the roots. Drop one stick that has the percussion cap and about 18 or 20 inches of fuse connected with it, and by putting a little dynamite at the end of the fuse it can easily be kindled off with a match. The big loosened roots should be followed up and all gotten out. The next thing is to fill the hole with fresh soil from an old fence row, or anywhere else where good rich soil can be obtained, and plant a young tree in the center.

Where the benefits of blowing out instead of grubbing come in is that the diseases of the old tree are well cured. If the roots of the trees that have been blown out are closely examined they will probably be found to be very badly diseased or covered with aphids, and perhaps both, for one naturally brings the other. There is no doubt in my mind that the root aphides on our trees cost us many dollars, but just because they are hidden from sight we do not realize the damage they are doing.

After removing all the old trees that have passed their period of usefulness, it is a good plan to take a scraper which is made somewhat on the order of a triangular one, with a short handle set in the middle of it, and scrape all the rough, loosened bark from the trunks of those trees that are left, and as high upon the branches as that kind of bark extends. This will save considerable of the spray material when the trees are being sprayed, and it will be better made use of to force the mixture into every crack and crevice, searching out every foe. Then it is well to cut out a dead and decaying limb, cutting back and thinning a great deal of that short stubby growth that is natural to an old tree.

The old orchard needs plenty of food-making material, and it should be given a good, heavy coat of stable manure. Right here a difference will be noted. Those old trees have no doubt exhausted practically all the available nutritive material contained in that soil, and they also need considerable nitrogen in order to produce new wood and to put fresh new vigor into them, and therefore they will stand lots of stable manure.

KILLED BY DERRICK IN BARTON GRANITE SHED

William Rook Hit on Head by Flying Casting from Broken Boom, Killed Instantly at Barton—Brother of Member of Firm.
