

A CLOSE CALL FOR OCCUPANTS

Ex-Gov. Sprague's Mansion Was Destroyed To-day

AT NARRAGANSETT PIER

Building Contained Great Lot of Art Treasures and Costly Furnishings, Making the Total Loss \$600,000.

Narragansett Pier, R. I., Oct. 11.—The mansion of former Governor William E. Sprague, called "Canaan," was destroyed by fire to-day, causing a loss of \$600,000 and wiping out a big collection of art treasures.

It is supposed that the fire was caused by a defective chimney. The building was of wood and was four stories in height, being one of the most beautiful residences in the state of Rhode Island.

BODY IDENTIFIED BY ITS CLOTHES

Miss Blanche A. Dextra of Lowell, Mass., Was Found Dead in Canal at Lowell, Mass.

Lowell, Mass., Oct. 11.—With her hands wound about her hands, the body of Miss Blanche A. Dextra, a youthful and talented singer and artist of this city, was found in the canal near the former Vesper Country club house off Pawtucket street early yesterday morning by two boys.

Miss Dextra had been strangely missing from her home on Merrimack street since early last Monday morning, and it had been reported that she left Lowell to join a leading opera company.

KILLED BY FALLING MOTOR.

Springfield Man Crushed in Providence by Heavy Machine.

Providence, R. I., Oct. 11.—George B. Carey, 35 years old, of Springfield, employed here by the Narragansett Electric Lighting Company, was killed here last night by the falling of a heavy electric motor.

Carey and several other men were sent to the house, 9 Callender street, on the fourth floor, where they were installing a large motor. He was in charge of the gang of workmen, and the motor, which weighs about 600 pounds, was held up by a chain and pulley.

The local police have taken "Webb's" picture for their Bertillon records, and the pictures will be circulated in order that police of other cities may learn if the fellow is wanted for other crimes.

SWEDEN IS ALARMED.

Great difficulty is experienced in raising funds to assist the unemployed, by those who are employed. Alarmed by the conditions, the government is making strenuous efforts to reconcile the men with the manufacturers, feeling that it may be called on to support the unemployed.

TO EXCLUDE PUBLIC.

EVIDENCES OF MURDER

Female Recluse of Wallingford Probably Strangled

SURROUNDED BY 14 CATS

Mary J. Johnson's Body Found by a Neighbor Yesterday Morning—State's Attorney Jones of Rutland County Making Investigation.

Wallingford, Oct. 11.—An object of loving attention by the 14 cats which were her only companions in life, the body of Miss Mary J. Johnson, 67 years old, was found yesterday in her lonely home near "The Bridges" in circumstances indicating murder.

Although detained under the charge of intoxication, Robert Eddy, who has served a sentence in state prison, according to the police, is being held largely because he is unable satisfactorily to account for his whereabouts on Saturday night, when it is believed the murder, if murder it is, was committed.

ACCUSES POLICEMAN.

BOY HANGS SELF WITH BLANKET

Parents Find Body in Home at Lynn. Mason Earlier Denies Sister Admission to His Room.

Lynn, Mass., Oct. 11.—For reasons known only to himself, according to members of his family, Harry L. Mason, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Liphina Mason of 161 Marianna street, committed suicide in his home yesterday afternoon by hanging himself. About noon his mother called him, but receiving no response from his room supposed that the boy had gone out by a window, as he occasionally did. She then went to a meeting in camp Progress, where she remained during the afternoon.

WOMAN HANGS SELF.

Mrs. Cora Burgess of South Portland Commits Suicide in Barn.

Portland, Me., Oct. 11.—Brooding over domestic troubles, Mrs. Cora Burgess, wife of John Burgess of South Portland, went into the barn adjoining her home yesterday morning and hanged herself.
