TOOK FLIGHT OVER PARIS

Lambert Does a Sensational Stunt

HE WENT UP 1,000 FT., TOO

He Circled Eiffel Tower in a Wright Biplane and Then Sailed Over the French City.

Paris, Oct. 19.—Count de Lambert, the French aviator, made a remarkable and sensational flight in a Wright biplane yesterday afternoon. Leaving the Jurvis aviation field he flew to Paris, circled about the Eiffel tower, at times reaching a height of about one thousand feet above the city, and then returned to Jurvis.

The aeronaut left the aerodrome at Jurvis at 4:35 p. m., traveling at a height of about 250 feet, and headed northward. Half an hour later the biplane approaching the city, high in the air, from the southward. As the machine neared the Seine it ascended higher and higher, finally passing over the Eiffel tower, at an estimated distance of three hundred feet, or fifteen hundred feet from the ground. The machine then described a wide curve and headed southward.

Count de Lambert received a great ovation on returning to the aviation field here after his flight to Paris and around the Eiffel tower. After the machine disappeared from sight over the hills in the direction of Paris the spectators became greatly interested and when it was announced that the aviator had reached the capital the excitement became intense. Darkness was already falling as the crowds waited breathlessly for the machine to return, and when finally sighted, a mere speck on the horizon in the gathering gloom, a sense of indescribable enthusiasm occurred. Amid frantic cheers the machine came closer and closer and on finally reaching the enclosure circled the course and alighted gently before its shed.

A few minutes before Count de Lambert returned to the aviation field here from his flight to Paris, Alfred M. Blanc, the French aeronaut, attempted his first flight in a Blériot machine. Shortly after ascending the monoplane, as the result of a false shift of the rudder, turned into the tribune and fell, mortally wounding a woman and injuring a dozen other persons.

TWO CHANGES IN CENSUS

In Getting at the Manufacturing Data

WILL NOT USE AVERAGE

In Finding Out Number of Workers Employed But Will Take the Number of One Specific Week.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 19.—U. S. Census Director Durand announces two very material changes in the schedule for manufactures to be carried by the special agents employed in collecting the data for the thirteenth census.

"At the censuses of 1900 and 1905," stated the director, "the manufactures schedule called for the average number of men, the average number of women, and the average number of children under 16, employed during each month in each establishment. Could this question have been answered accurately, it would undoubtedly have furnished information of much value and of greater value than that which we are now proposing to secure. To answer this interrogatory with strict accuracy would, however, require the special agent or the manufacturer, filling out the schedule, to go in detail through every pay-roll of the year, usually either 52 or 26 in number, counting the number of men, women and children separately on each—the segregation of those under 16 involving peculiar difficulty, particularly in the case of the earlier pay-rolls of the year—and averaging the count for each month. To do this, would, in my judgment, have required several times as long as to fill out all the remainder of the manufacturer's schedule except only the question on classified wages.

"As a matter of fact, practically none of the returns at the preceding census were, I am convinced, based on actual analyses of the pay-rolls. They were in nearly all cases mere estimates more or less obtained by the manufacturer or his bookkeepers, and there is every reason to believe that these estimates were often wide of the mark.

"The schedule as it has been revised for the present census calls for the number of men, women and children employed during one specific week only, and for the total number employed, without indication of age or sex, on the first pay-roll of each month. The relative extent to which women and children are employed will be ascertained approximately from the figures for the selected week; and, although that week will not, perhaps, in some industries be typical of the year as a whole, the accuracy of the figures will more than compensate for the apparent sacrifice in the amount of information obtained.

"We have also deemed it wise to cut out the question with regard to classified wages to which I have just referred, and which appeared in the census schedules of 1900 and 1905. These schedules called for the number of employees during a selected week, classified according to their earnings, and also separating men, women, and children under 16. This interrogatory, if correctly answered, would furnish information of great value. We have become convinced, however, that for many establishments correct answers cannot be obtained by any

PITTSBURGH CELEBRATED BASE BALL VICTORY

Big, High-old Time Held Last Night With a Nondescript Parade to Forbes Field.

Pittsburg, Oct. 19.—The yells of joy which went up from Pittsburg last night could be heard as far as Detroit. The Pirate crew, which had taken the measure of the Tigers was given an ovation such as no other baseball club had ever been accorded.

It was a nondescript mob which followed twelve bands and hundreds of automobiles carrying the players and city officials. Mayor Magee, who had ordered the celebration, appointed his department chief's division marshalls and the south side, north side and surrounding hills sent forth their mob of rooters who massed behind the bands in a solid phalanx.

Three military organizations lent color to the procession, and half of dozen political clubs with banners formed in line. The streets were jammed with people and the noise was worse than a battle.

Babe Adams thrice winner over the Detroitis received the greatest ovation in Forbes' Field when he was called to the platform to receive his check. Besides his part of the winnings he received a purse of \$1,264 which had been subscribed by his admirers, of which the Pittsburg players donated \$500.

The crowd called on Adams for a speech but the young man was unable to give utterance to his thoughts and tears trickled down his cheeks.

Foot Ball Notes.

The defeat of the Annapolis team by the Villanova team was a decided surprise and showed the Navy to be rather weak this year. From the way the two teams showed up Saturday, the Army should have the best of it when the two teams get together.

Yale showed more class in the game with West Point than she has shown

this season and the general opinion is that Yale will have a as strong a team as usual when she gets well started.

Harvard showed poor form in Saturday's game against Maine, and several important changes will be made in the line by the coaches as a result of that game.

Howe seemed to qualify as Yale's quarterback rather more than Johnson did in Saturday's game with the Army.

amount of effort, and that for other establishments the amount of effort necessary to obtain answers would involve expense and delay precluded by the limitations of our appropriations and requirements as to the date of publishing the results. Strictly speaking, this inquiry falls within the field of the bureau of labor rather than that of the census bureau. It may be, however, that at another census, in order to take advantage of the fact that census agents are to visit every manufacturing establishment, we shall ask the authority of Congress to provide a separate schedule covering classified wages and an extra appropriation to get it properly filled out.

actual pay-rolls. It would not be essential that estimates of classified wages be secured from every establishment. If such returns could be secured for even 50 per cent. of the establishments, they would be of great interest, and the agents should be specifically instructed to accept no estimates.

"The reason for these two changes in the manufactures schedule is found not only in the difficulty in answering the former inquiries properly, but in the fact that they tend to injure the accuracy of the replies to all the other interrogatories in the schedule. The schedule of manufactures hitherto has been overloaded."
