DEATH NOW CLEARED UP

Finding of the Skeleton Last Week
Leads to Quick Solution of
Murder Mystery at
Islip, L. I.

New York, Oct. 26.—Otto Mueller, who under the name of Fred Gebhardt, was arrested at Astoria, L. I. Sunday night for the murder of Annie Luther, whose skeleton was found a week ago last Sunday in the woods near Islip, L. I., confessed yesterday that he shot Annie Luther in the woods near Bayshore on April 9, 1908.

"I told Annie Luther," Mueller confessed "out at Bayshore, L. I., that I was married and had a wife and two children, and that I must leave her and go back to my wife. I had taken her down to Bayshore to show her some property. She screamed and ran after me. She kissed me and pulled me back. I shot her then. I did not look at her after that, and I don't remember whether I shot her more than once. I left her in the woods after I shot her and I went over to the Islip station and came home. I threw my revolver away out of the car window on the way home."

Later Mueller was arraigned on the charge of homicide and was committed to the Riverhead jail. There will be an inquest on the murder today.

SUBMARINE GOES DOWN

Viper Strained Near Delaware Breakwater.
Delaware Breakwater, Del., Oct. 26.—The submarine boat Viper, which came into this harbor last night with the Tarantula and Plunger and the gunboat Casino, dragged around last night off the northwestern end of the breakwater and is still fast in the sand. The life-saving crew from Lewes is on board ready to render the assistance necessary. The submarine is lying easy and it is expected will be floated at the next high water with the assistance of the gunboat. A high northwestern wind prevailed last night which caused the Viper to drag her anchors. The submarines and the gunboat are bound from Brooklyn for Charleston.

JEFFRIES WON'T FIGHT SAYS HIS FATHER

Thinks Johnson Bout Talk is all a Bluff.

Washington, Pa., Oct. 26.—The Rev. J. H. Jeffries of Fremont, Fairfield county, Ohio, father of Jim Jeffries, the heavy-weight pugilist, declared here yesterday that his son and Jack Johnson will never face each other in the prize ring.

"Jim will never fight Johnson. He will not enter the ring again, and would not fight a negro anyway. This is the only straight news there is concerning Jim, and you can bank on it being gospel truth."

The older Jeffries is visiting the Rev. J. M. Work, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church at Canonsburg, eight miles north of here. He stopped over here for a couple of days on his way to Philadelphia, where he will arrive next week to meet Jim. In speaking of the proposed Jeffries-Johnson bout the Rev. Mr. Jeffries made some unusual statements. He says that Jim never had any idea of taking on the big negro, that he was well paid for all the advertisements the pugilist promoters and others got out of the publicity given a proposed match between the two men, and that Jeffries, even if he did want to fight, would not be able to gain the necessary condition for months to come.

"Why Jim is still far from fighting condition," continued the older Jeffries. "He couldn't get into condition to fight for months. He wrote me that he had not trained a half hour a day while he was away, and that anybody that knows him knows that for him to get into condition it will require the hardest kind of training over a long period."

"Months ago I made him promise he would never fight a negro, and you can bet he won't. That was one of the last things he told me when I saw him before he went to Europe. I know he is credited with saying that he will fight just as soon as satisfactory arrangements can be made. You can take it from me, however, that Jim Jeffries will never meet the negro in the ring."

QUIET IN MADRID.

Protest Against the Late Cabinet's Policy was Orderly.

Madrid, Oct. 26.—The demonstration organized yesterday to protest against the policy of the late Cabinet was orderly and peaceful. An enormous crowd took part in the affair, but there was no demonstration of violence. The Duke de Tovar, the Civil Governor, was warmly cheered. The elaborate police precautions were unnecessary, as the people who took part in the meeting dispersed quietly after very orderly proceedings.

Similar meetings which were held at Saragossa and Bilbao were equally orderly and peaceful.

FARMHAND SLAIN.

Second Victim in a Week of Fatal Rows at Albany.

Albany, Oct. 26.—Another murder was added yesterday to the recent list of the criminal history of Albany county. But a week ago Jim La Chonelle was killed and Lester Felicit charged with the crime, and early this morning in the hotel of Ward Hennessey on the Schuylkill road, Nunella Pappas, a farmhand, 25 years old, was beaten on the head with a bottle, as alleged in the hands of William Smith.

Felicit died later in the Albany hospital. Smith was arrested. He asserted that he acted in self-defense.

DOWN THE MISSISSIPPI

President Taft Starts on 1200 Mile Sail

SPEAKS ON WATERWAYS

He Favors Legislation, But Declares There is To Be No "Pork Barrel" in It.

St. Louis, Oct. 26.—President Taft started his 1200 mile trip down the Mississippi river yesterday to the tooting of whistles and the cheers of thousands. Fifteen big Mississippi river steamboats, bearing a notable escort, swung out behind the little United States light house tender Oleaner, on which the President is quartered. Included in the escort are the Vice-President of the United States, two cabinet members, twenty United States senators, four representatives of foreign nations, the speaker of the House of Representatives with 176 of his fellow Congressmen and hundreds of prominent business men of the Middle West. It is the greatest show that was ever pulled off in an effort to push legislation through Congress.

The excursion is running under the auspices of the Lakes and Gulf Deep Waterways Association and is to end at the annual convention of the association in New Orleans.

As Governor Hadley of Missouri describes the trip, "It is to be for exploration and investigation." President Taft himself hardly regards it as a pleasure trip. "We are on the eve," said he yesterday, "of a great journey down the Mississippi and cursed be he who calls it a junkie."

President Taft made it plain here again today that as a general proposition, he is in favor of having bonds issued to pay for the deepening of the country's waterways. At the same time he declared with almost brutal frankness that there was to be no "pork barrel" policies in the improvements. Each project was to be determined solidly on its merits.

The President apparently intended his statement as a warning to Speaker Cannon and the 177 Congressmen who were sitting before him and every one of them took it without winking an eyelash. Speaker Cannon, who has held the cover to the pork barrel for a good many years, listened attentively. To-day President Taft will stop at Cairo.

TAFT IN ST. LOUIS.

He Was Very Hoarse Today From Too Much Speaking.

St. Louis, Oct. 26.—President Taft arrived today from Dallas and was very hoarse. He breakfasted at the St. Louis club and spoke very briefly at the Coliseum. He lunched with the Business Men's League at the Planters hotel. In the afternoon he will visit East St. Louis and then board the Oleaner for his down-the-river trip.

MANILA SMUGGLERS TO PRISON.

William Kennedy and a Chinese are Sentenced.

Manila, Oct. 26.—William Kennedy and a Chinese banker were today found guilty of conspiracy to smuggle opium into the Philippines and were sentenced each to one year's imprisonment. The court martial of captain Frank Wickham of the Twelfth Infantry, U. S. A., who is charged with intoxication while on duty, opened at Fort William McKinley today. Colonel Sidney W. Taylor, of the Second Field Artillery, is president of the court.

CAN'T SEE THE POPE.

Russian Monarch in Italy Sends Message to Rome.

Rome, Oct. 26.—The Vatican has received a note from the Czar regretting his inability to visit the Pope during his visit to Italy at the present time. The note says the Russian monarch would have been pleased to call upon the sovereign pontiff if his itinerary called for a stop in Rome.

ICE TRIAL DIFFICULT.

Prosecution Finds it Hard to Get the Evidence Desired.

New York, Oct. 26.—John R. Bennett, secretary of the American Ice company yesterday supplied the prosecution in the trial of the ice company for alleged violation of the anti-monopoly law with a number of papers and documents which he had been summoned to furnish. Mr. Bennett, who was the principal witness called by the prosecution last week, was the first witness to be called when the trial was resumed today before Justice Wheeler of the Supreme Court. His examination, conducted by Special Deputy Attorney General James W. Osborne, failed to reveal the whereabouts of a missing minute book of the company which has been sought or to disclose just what the company received for \$15,000,000 turned over to Augustus C. Sprague, who is regarded as having been the agent for the American Ice company, in the buying up of independent plants. Mr. Osborne introduced today a number of bills of sale and agreements by which the ice company had acquired various ice businesses. Among them were specified upwards of a dozen independent ice businesses in this city supplying in the aggregate more than 12,000 customers. The documents showed that upwards of \$3,331,000 had been paid for these businesses. For one block of companies acquired Charles W. Morse and William H. Gelabehn were named as the selling owners mentioned in these transactions. Sprague and Gelabehn are dead and Morse in prison.

SEVERAL APPOINTMENTS SOON.

Taft Will Make Them on His Return.

Washington, Oct. 26.—The probability is that a batch of appointments will come at the same time as that of the Supreme Court. The ministerial to China made vacant by the recall of Mr. Crane is still unfilled. There is still an assistant secretaryship of the Treasury waiting for a new man and Assistant Secretary McHarg of the Department of Commerce and Labor, who resigned two months ago, but who has continued to occupy the office because no one appeared to take up the work, intends to leave the Department at the end of this week.

"Even if I am never on time again, I shall be at my desk in my office in New York, back in my profession, at nine o'clock sharp to the dot next Monday morning," said Acting Secretary of Commerce and Labor McHarg, today. Mr. McHarg has been trying to get away from the assistant secretaryship for some time, but has postponed his retirement because of the delay in the selection of his successor. His resignation was finally submitted to take effect the last of this month. Secretary Nagel is with the presidential party and was expected to confer with the President regarding the appointment of an assistant secretary. Pending such appointment and qualification for office, solicitor East of the department will be acting secretary.

GOVERNOR CRITICISED.

Methodists Resent Charges Against Churches.

Indianapolis, Oct. 26.—At a meeting of the Methodist Ministers' Association today, Governor Marshall was severely criticised and a resolution adopted censuring him for the following utterances at a meeting of the Associated Charities at Columbus last night.

"When the average man joins the church, Mrs. Millionaire looks at him, he cannot sit in my pew, he does not belong to my set, when the average woman joins the church her standing depends on the cut of her gown or the style of her hat. If the church of the living God would get back to where man and woman were brother or sister, the churches of this state would soon be filled with communists."

CONFESSES MURDER OF CHILD.

To Save Her Husband From the Electric Chair.

Suffolk, Va., Oct. 26.—Placing herself in the shadow of the electric chair in order to save her husband from a similar fate, Vinie Pugh yesterday afternoon confessed to murder at a coroner's inquest. William Pugh was arrested Saturday, accused of murdering his four-year-old daughter, Mamie, but the mother was not suspected until yesterday when she took the stand during the post mortem examination, incriminating herself and holding her husband innocent. The girl's body was exhumed and an examination showed that her skull had been fractured.

STRIKERS USE DYNAMITE.

Explosions in Two Buildings in Indianapolis.

Indianapolis, Oct. 26.—An explosion of dynamite wrecked a branch exchange building under construction for the Central Union Telephone company early today. The police say that the explosion was caused by striking employees of the contractor. The loss is \$4,000. About the same time another explosion destroyed the contractors stable. The automobiles were destroyed and 2 horses were killed in the stable of the contractor, Carl Voyn Sprackelson. No one was hurt in either explosion.

Oyster Kills Him.

Columbus, O., Oct. 26.—Charles A. Klobb, chairman of the Democratic State Central Committee, died at his home in Columbus this morning from ptomaine poisoning, which resulted from eating oysters.

CLAIMS ON NEW YORK ELECTION

All Three Mayoralty Candidates Confident of Victory

THEY ALL CLAIM VICTORY

Charges Against Tammany of Traffic in White Slaves Arouses Much Comment—Will Play Prominent Part in Campaign.

New York, Oct. 26.—New York's stirring municipal campaign entered yesterday upon the definitely prophetic stage and already the managers of the various canvases for mayoralty honors are making predictions in figures.

Starting with the prediction of Republican County Chairman Herbert Parsons that Otto T. Bamard, the Republican fusion candidate for mayor, will be elected for a plurality of at least 12,000, the mathematical experts of the other candidates have figures ready to show that substantial pluralities will be forthcoming for both William J. Gaynor, the Democratic candidate and William R. Hearst, candidate of the Civic Alliance.

The confidence thus manifested, however, will not result in any cessation of hard work by any of the parties.

Indeed this, practically the last week of the campaign, will witness activity almost unprecedented in the history of New York's municipal campaigns, fast and furious as some of them have been.

The candidates for mayor, themselves will take the leading parts in the wind-up of the battle. Mr. Gaynor, during the next six days is scheduled to make no fewer than 17 speeches, while some 14 speaking dates have been arranged for Mr. Hearst. Mr. Bamard, however, will probably be the busiest of the trio. His programme calls for 8 or 10 speeches, each evening of the week.

city, is expected to play a considerable part in the closing canvass, while the former lines of assault upon and defense of that organization's relations to city government will naturally be followed up to the bitter end.

MILWAUKEE SHAKEN.

Brewery Blowup Kills a Man and Injures Five.

Milwaukee, Oct. 26.—Three boilers in the power house of the Pabst brewery exploded yesterday, killing one man, but fatally injuring another and causing damage estimated at \$250,000. Five men were sent to hospitals.

Fred Stern was the man killed. The cause of the explosion was not ascertained, as the power plant was wrecked. The explosion shook up the city within a radius of half a mile of the brewery, many windows being broken.

TAFT EXERCISES CLEMENCY

Commutes Sentence of Subordinate of Wrecked Allegheny Bank.

Washington, Oct. 26.—President Taft has commuted to three years the seven year sentence imposed upon Thomas W. Harvey, a subordinate connected with the wrecked Enterprise National bank of Allegheny, Pa. The cashier of the bank killed himself and some of the chief conspirators escaped punishment on technicalities. The commutation of Harvey's sentence, which he began to serve about a year ago in Western Penitentiary of Pennsylvania was made on the ground that he was largely a tool of others.
