And a Third Railroad Man Lost Leg and is Dying

DUE TO MISPLACED SWITCH

Rear-end Collision in New York Central Railroad Yard This Morning Caused Suffering and Loss To-day.

Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 29.—A misplaced switch caused fatal injuries to three men employed by the New York Central rail road in the local yard this morning. Those killed outright were as follows: Reinhardt Strassman, a fireman; Arthur Cahman, night yard master; George Herbert, yard master.

LIFE CRUSHED OUT BY AN ELEVATOR

James Collins, 19, of West Rutland Was Crushed to Death at Vermont Marble Company's Shop Late Yesterday.

Rutland, Oct. 29.—James Collins of West Rutland, 19 years old, was instantly killed in the finishing shop of the Vermont Marble Company at Center Rutland about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Collins and another workman were on the freight elevator at the time making a trip to the attic of the building for some stock. At each door the elevator shaft is covered by doors which work automatically as the elevator passes up or down.

BARRE ENTERS NEW FIELD

Company to be Formed to Handle Building Stone FROM BARRE QUARRIES

Enthusiastic Meeting of Citizens Last Night to Launch the Project—A Stock Company Will Be Formed. As a result of the movement started only a very short time ago by the Barre board of trade to push Barre granite into the market as a building stone and increase the granite industry in Barre, an enthusiastic meeting, attended by fifty business and professional men of the city, was held last evening in the board of trade rooms in the C. W. Averill block and a vote was carried to instruct the special committee previously appointed by the board of trade to approach the business men of the city and ascertain the opinions of the project; also to petition the secretary of state for a charter for the forming of a stock company to engage in the manufacture and sale of building granite.

WAS BURIED AS A SOLDIER

Remains of General O. O. Howard Rest at Burlington

Burlington, Oct. 29.—The funeral of General Oliver Otis Howard, attended by a throng of mourners from every walk in life, was held at eleven o'clock today at the First Congregational church. Rev. Ernest C. Guthrie, pastor of the church, officiated and paid feeling tribute to the memory of the distinguished soldier and civil servant. Six colored sergeants from the 10th Cavalry at Fort Ethan Allen acted as guard of honor and body pall bearers, and the long procession to the grave in Lake View cemetery was headed by the entire Tenth Cavalry under the direction of Col. Jones, the commanding officer.
