### ABOUT THE STATE

Daily Herald of Lincoln show a pro-  
posed deer in South Tisbury Monday.

During the first two days of the deer  
season 41 deer were killed in the im-  
mediate vicinity of Brattleboro.

The first deer killed this season by  
a woman went to Mrs. Minnie Davis  
of Johnson. She brought down a fine  
suck with the first shot.

Game Warden Joseph Brown of Bran-  
dolph arrested John Rice of Bethel on  
Wednesday on the charge of shooting a  
fawn that weighed but 40 pounds.

O. D. French and Senator O. S. Skin-  
ner of the town of Orleans are soon to  
present that town a town clock. The  
clock will be placed in the Congrega-  
tional church tower.

Erna Greig of Stowe, aged 80, was  
one of the lucky hunters in Stowe. It  
needed in bringing down a fine buck  
with a rifle that has been in his pos-  
session nearly 60 years.

Seven more sheep belonging to C. M.  
Winslow of Brandon have been shot  
within the last three days. This makes  
a total of 34 sheep that have been shot  
within the past two weeks. The select-  
men of that town are making an invest-  
igation.

Architect A. L. Lawrence of Burling-  
ton has an exhibition in Burlington a  
large picture of the proposed Champlain  
memorial. The proposed monument  
stands at the foot of the Champlain  
River at the base of the monument. The  
estimated cost will be about \$10,000.

A special jury of 25 men has been  
tried in Rutland county for the  
murder of Robert Eddy, charged with the  
murder of Mary J. Johnson in Walling-  
ford. This was made necessary because  
all but 22 of the regular panel had been  
allowed to go to their homes before  
Eddy was indicted.

D. H. Beddell of Morrisville suffered  
a painful injury Saturday as he was  
driving through North Hyde Park. As  
he was driving along at a good pace, he  
ran into a stake which had been driven  
into the road and the wagon was over-  
turned. In falling Mr. Beddell struck  
his head and shoulder and beside  
receiving several bruises the ligaments  
of his neck and shoulder were strained.  
A badly sprained knee completed the  
list of his injuries.

### ORANGE COUNTY DECISIONS

At Recent Term of the Vermont Su-  
preme Court.

Chelsea, Oct. 29.—At the last term of  
supreme court several decisions were  
handed down in Orange county cases  
which will be of interest to the people  
throughout the county to know and  
which are as follows:

In Geo. B. Foster vs. the International  
Toolpick company, apt., which was  
tried at the December term, 1908, in  
which a verdict was rendered for the  
plaintiff to recover the sum of \$124.30;  
judgment of the lower court was re-  
versed and the case remanded for a  
new trial, which petition was dismissed  
with costs.

American Machinery & Export Co. vs.  
Drugs Brothers; a case in assumpsit,  
heard at the December term of court;  
verdict ordered for defendant and sent  
to supreme court on plaintiff's excep-  
tions.

Herbert F. Flint vs. A. Elbridge Hol-  
man, slander; heard at the December  
term, 1908; verdict for plaintiff to re-  
cover the sum of \$400 and costs; passed  
to supreme court on defendant's excep-  
tions; judgment of county court sus-  
tained. Execution issued and for want  
of satisfaction defendant was committed  
to jail and during his confinement he  
concealed himself and petitioned for a  
writ of habeas corpus on the ground of newly discovered  
evidence, and the defendant was admit-  
ted to bail, which he furnished, and was  
released from custody; in supreme court  
the petition, after hearing, was dismissed  
with costs.

George Lane vs. Central Vermont Rail-  
way company; case heard at the Decem-  
ber term, 1904, when a verdict was  
ordered for the defendant; judgment on  
verdict and caused passed to supreme  
court on exceptions by plaintiff. Or-  
dered not to be brought forward.

Woodville Guaranty Savings Bank vs.  
Albert Rogers et al.; trial at the Decem-  
ber term, 1908; verdict ordered for de-  
fendants, Orest and Flanders, and  
judgment of the lower court was re-  
versed and the case remanded.

James B. Lowrie and others vs. Wil-  
Ham H. Salisbury and others; this was  
a suit in chancery brought in 1895 and  
referred to Hon. Wm. P. Dillingham as  
special master to hear the evidence and  
report his findings to the chancellor, and  
whose report was favorable to the or-  
trators, and agreeable to the report a pro  
forma decree was ordered, requiring a  
stated amount to be paid to said or-  
trators and a perpetual injunction issued  
restraining the defendants from using cer-  
tain water which they claimed they had  
a right to use, to which decree order of  
the defendants excepted and the cause  
passed to the supreme court, and the  
decree of the court of chancery was re-  
versed and the cause remanded with the  
following mandate, viz: "That the report  
be recommitted to the master for fur-  
ther hearing and report to the aforesaid  
court of chancery."
