**TREASURES BY NIGHT RIDERS.**  
Mason County (Kentucky) Man Asks for Troops.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 5.—Jackson is quiet for the present, and Mason county has again taken the center of the stage, one of its residents having called for troops as protection against night riders. The applicant is Ben Longenecker, whose young daughter some nights ago had been a group of night riders at the muzzle of a gun. Longenecker has made his call through the department of the adjutant general, but the information at Frankfort, the state capital, is that when the sheriff of Mason county offered Longenecker protection the former refused to tell who was threatening him. For this reason, it is said, Governor Wilson is inclined to send troops.

The Lexington company, under Captain J. R. Sams, was yesterday at Jackson to maintain order until the present session of the grand jury adjourns on Saturday. Wednesday night's freedom from shooting and disorder at Jackson is attributed to Sheriff Crawford, who used his influence to restrain the mountaineers.

The Oread Literary club of Johnson has issued invitations to the dedicatory exercises of a new library building, to be held in the opera house at 2 on the afternoon of November 10.

Word has been received in Rutland of the death of Prof. Oscar Atwood of property at the Cheney in Prairie Du Lac, Wisconsin. Prof. Atwood was the principal of the Rutland high school for some years.

Miss Ella Allton of West Charleston cut her wrist quite badly the first of the week by the breaking of a fruit jar. A physician was called, and eight stitches were taken in the wound. Miss Allton is very weak from loss of blood.

George F. Clark of East Wallingford had a horse and carriage taken from a shed on the Cheney in Rutland early Monday morning. The police were notified some time after the loss was discovered, and efforts are being made to trace the team.

W. J. Trompe of East Ryegate has obtained a patent on a felt adjustment which is used by paper makers and has assigned the right to manufacture for ten years to O. V. Hooker & Son of St. Johnsbury. A number of the felts have already been installed in different paper plants, and it is thought the new invention will be a tremendous success.

The annual meeting of the Vermont Fish and Game league will be held at the Van Ness house, Burlington, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., Wednesday, Nov. 10, for the following purposes: reports; presentation for membership; election of president, seven vice-presidents, treasurer, secretary, an executive committee of 14 members, one in each county, a committee of three on membership and an auditing committee of three. Maxwell Everts of Windsor is at present president and Henry G. Thomas of Stowe, secretary.

**SMOKERS EJECTED.**  
And They Were, in Consequence Indignant and Inclined to Fight.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—Following initial failure to abolish smoking on the Chicago & Oak Park elevated railroad by polite persuasion, more vigorous methods were put in practice yesterday and with success.

Men who insisted on smoking, as usual, in spite of orders to the contrary, received repayment of their fares with a request that they leave the train.

If still obdurate, private detectives ejected the offenders.

In the majority of cases cigars were abandoned upon the appearance of the detectives, but a dozen or more men resisted to the last and were ejected. The matter probably will go to the court.

A small riot in which two men were injured, accompanied the ejection of one passenger. An elderly, well dressed man entered a car smoking a cigar. When told that he was violating a rule of the company the smoker replied that he was violating no city ordinance.

The conductor called two private detectives to his assistance and the latter started to drag the passenger from the train when others interfered. The officers drew their revolvers and forced them back. F. D. Atley, a lumberman, was nearly forced through a window and was badly cut by breaking glass.

Former Alderman Joseph H. Francis was forced from the car platform and fell to the tracks, barely escaping death by the third rail. The "smokeless smoker" was then detached from the train and the original offender was taken to the police station.
