NEW POLICY AMONG PEERS

Cromer Not to Vote Against the Budget

HIS ATTITUDE SIGNIFICANT

He is a Free Trade Unionist Leader. An Important Announcement Is Made by Lorenburn.

London, Nov. 24.—Lord Cromer resumed the debate on the budget when the House of Lords met this afternoon. He said that he was opposed to many of the provisions of the finance measure, but was unable to support Lord Lansdowne's motion for its rejection.

STOCKS AGAIN DECLINE.

Follow Sharp Slump in Copper, Due to Report That Merger Can't Be Effected.

New York, Nov. 24.—Following a quiet though somewhat feverish opening of the stock market yesterday, there developed in the first hour an outburst of selling orders in the securities of Amalgamated Copper company, which sent that stock down from 9 1/4 to 8 7/8.

Reports that the proposed merger of the copper properties would have to be abandoned because of the federal courts decision in the Standard Oil case were said to be responsible for the sudden decline in the market. Several of the active stocks, including Smelters, Reading, Steel common, Union Pacific and Pennsylvania, fell a point or more.

Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 24.—Two women burglars masked and armed with revolvers, entered the residence of Mrs. Crossman, a Minneapolis society woman last night while she was seated in her library reading a book. She heard a noise in the hall, and went out to investigate. She saw two women leisurely taking hat pins from the hats on the rack. She was speechless with fright and stood helplessly watching them.

One of the women turned and saw Mrs. Crossman leaning on the door, nearly fainting and sided up to her. Mrs. Crossman declares she saw the muzzle of a revolver protruding from the sleeve of the burglar's waist but Mrs. Crossman managed to keep out of her reach. The robbers secured about \$400 in valuables.

FIVE DEAD IN FIRE.

Bodies Burned Beyond Recognition in N. Y. Tenement Fire.

New York, Nov. 24.—Five persons were burned to death in a fire last night in a frame tenement at 1490 Herkimer street, East New York. There were sixty persons in the house, which was a four-story structure.

When the bodies were taken out, they were so badly burned that it was impossible to tell whether they were men or women. Ten persons were seriously injured and removed to the hospital in ambulances.

The occupants of the tenement were foreigners. It is suspected that the fire is of incendiary origin.

A Safe, Quick Way to Clean Silver

(Guaranteed by the Gold Dust Twins) Instead of scouring and rubbing each piece of silver after each meal, put the silver in a separate tin by itself; cover with lukewarm water, to which a tablespoonful of Gold Dust washing powder has been added. New York, Nov. 24.—In a fashionable apartment house on West Fifty-fifth street, Mrs. Daisy von Marlow, 24 years old, wife of Clyde von Marlow, a magazine editor, recently of Dayton, O., died yesterday, supposedly from poison.

A bottle, which contained a deadly fluid, was found on bureau in Mrs. von Marlow's room. Mrs. von Marlow appeared in the best of spirits when she retired Monday night. Mr. von Marlow was found in an up-town hotel.

LARGEST EVER BAKED.

Mince Pie for President Weighs Fifty Pounds.

New York, Nov. 24.—Two mince pies, either of which would throw into the shade the "kind mother made," were put into the ovens at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, and, when baked, were sent, the larger one to President Taft, the smaller to Mayor-elect Gaynor, for Thanksgiving.


