

International Paper Company Mills at Glens Falls, N. Y., Affected.
Glens Falls, N. Y., March 7.—A general strike of the employees of the International Paper company, fremen, engineers and carpenters excepted, was declared yesterday. Over 600 men walked out.
Final action was taken at a meeting of the labor unions represented in the mill and a back-tended. The strikers say the direct cause of the strike is the failure of the company to grant a promised increase in wages. Union men state that within twenty-four hours the Glens Falls and Fort Edward mills will also be affected unless an increase is granted.
