

EVANGELINE REX SOLD.

Queen of Snow Path Bought by Edmund Strong.

Manchester, N. H., March 17.—Evangeline Rex, queen of the New Hampshire snow path, was sold yesterday to Edmund Strong of this city. The price was said to be around \$600. Mr. Strong intends to work the mare out this summer around the city, and next winter will campaign her through the state, with an open challenge to all comers.

This speedy little mare, who was sired by Rex American, has a record of 2:19 1/4, which was made a few seasons ago. She was bred on the celebrated Hamlin farm in East Aurora, N. Y., and was originally bought by Mr. Strong, who later sold her to Lester Brooks. Her age is said to be 10 years.

She has won every match race in which she has been entered since Brooks has owned her, and this winter she has beaten Frank Bain of this city, Oradell of Concord, and Tuesday she won three straight heats from Silverheels at Pittsfield. Her performance this last season has surprised even her staunchest supporters and great things are expected of her next winter.
