

SENATOR ALLDS GUILTY

Bribery Charges Sustained by Legislature.

VOTE IN CASE DECISIVE

Counsel Calls It a Mockery of Justice. Senator Cenger Is Now Likely to Be Put on Trial Next.

Albany, N. Y., March 30.—The Senate yesterday, by a vote of 40 to 9, sustained the charge that Senator Allds had demanded and taken a bribe. It was unable to punish Allds, however, for yesterday morning, before the vote began, he resigned his position in the Senate.

The question of what shall be done with Senator Cenger, Allds' accuser, still remains. Majority Leader Cobb introduced a resolution providing for the formal presentation of charges against Cenger, based on the evidence brought out by the investigation that he gave a bribe to influence legislation.

The Senate postponed action on this proposition until to-day and adjourned for the day, after formally adopting the report of the committee of the whole, in which the question was first decided. The Senate vote was 28 to 8.

Allds was not in the Senate chamber, but Senator Cenger sat all through the proceedings with his wife at his side. When the final vote was announced, he turned to his wife and smiled.

A statement given out by counsel for Allds yesterday afternoon declared that Allds resigned on the advice of his attorneys, because the latter were satisfied that his case was not to be decided by the evidence, but by political expediency and influence brought to bear from Washington and elsewhere.

Allds' resignation makes it possible for Governor Hughes to call a special election for the immediate selection of Allds' successor.

Provision for a general investigation of alleged legislative corruption will now be made with all speed.

Half an hour before his colleagues were scheduled to begin voting on the question of whether he took a bribe, Senator Allds resigned from the Senate. In view of frequent declarations that he would not take this course and would stand or fall by the decision of his colleagues, his action came as a thunder clap.

His resignation, filed with the secretary of state at 10:31 yesterday morning, reads as follows:

"Hon. Horace White, lieutenant governor of the state of New York and president of the Senate:

"Dear Sir: I, Jotham P. Allds, do hereby resign the office of senator representing the 37th senatorial district of the state of New York, which I now hold.

"This resignation to take effect immediately.

"Dated March 29, 1919.

"Signed: Jotham P. Allds."

Before Allds sent his resignation to the secretary of state's office, he went to the financial clerk of the Senate and signed for his salary to date.

The battle that confronts Cenger is no longer to prove his charges. To this extent the Senate vindicated him yesterday, when forty of its forty-nine members voted that the charges had been sustained by the evidence brought before them during the past seven weeks. It is believed that Cenger came to the Senate yesterday, prepared to resign as soon as he received this vindication. However, this may be, he didn't resign, and developments make it likely that he will not do so.

The cause of this is a resolution introduced by Senator Cobb, the majority leader, providing for the appointment of a committee to present to the Senate charges against Cenger "growing out of his connection with legislation and the use of funds to influence the members of the legislature or other persons with reference thereto." Even Cenger's enemies admit that he is a fighter, and the belief is that he will oppose this attempt to deprive him of office as vigorously and with as free an expenditure of money as he attacked Allds.

CHILD STARTED A CHURCH

Dying, She Gave 37 Cents, Which Grew to \$75,000.

Philadelphia, March 30.—Believing on her deathbed that a new Methodist church should be started in Germantown, little Ethel Shingle, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Shingle, gave her mother 37 cents she had saved to start a fund for the church. That was 12 years ago.

From that time the fund has grown, until Monday, ground was broken for the Methodist church of the Advocate, at Wayne avenue and Queen lane. The church will cost \$75,000.

WALL STREET IS GETTING UNEASY

Letters Sent to President Taft Urge Moderation in the Dealing with the Corporations.

Washington, March 30.—It emanated yesterday from a high official source that letters are coming in from Wall Street and President Taft and members of his cabinet representing the serious nature of the situation that will be caused if the government wins in the tobacco and oil cases and the department of justice follows with an attack on various big combinations. These letters make gloomy predictions as to what will happen to business if the administration undertakes a number of anti-trust suits.

The representations thus far have apparently not halted President Taft in his determination to follow up the tobacco and oil decisions with suits against certain great combinations. Various suggestions as to legislation are being made to relieve the situation, but it does not look as if anything would be done this session.

DEATH CAME ON SHIPBOARD

Passing of Professor Alexander Agassiz of Harvard.

Boston, March 30.—Professor Alexander Agassiz of Harvard university, the president of the Calumet and Hecla Mining company, died on board the steamer Adriatic, Monday afternoon while journeying from Southampton to New York.

News of the famous scientist's death was received in a wireless message yesterday by Major Henry L. Higginson of this city, a brother-in-law of Professor Agassiz. The information was sent by Professor Agassiz's son, Max, who was accompanying his father.

So far as his intimates know, Professor Agassiz was in the best of health. Not since his departure from Europe had any word been received that would indicate that Professor Agassiz was suffering any ailment.

Alexander Agassiz, son of the famous naturalist, Prof. Jean Paul Louis Rodolph Agassiz, was born at Neuchatel, Switzerland, Dec. 17, 1835. He came to the United States when he was 14 years old and was graduated from Harvard college with the degree of bachelor of arts in 1855, receiving the degree of bachelor of science from the Lawrence scientific school two years later.

He had conducted several scientific expeditions to South America, where he inspected the Peruvian copper mines and made surveys of Lake Titicaca. He had also headed expeditions in many quarters of the globe, when a special study of marine plants and animal life was made.

Between 1874 and 1885 he was curator of the university museum at Harvard, and since 1902 had been director of the museum, his gifts to which have exceeded a million dollars.

TOWNS SAFE FROM LAVA

Although Etina's Activity Has Increased, Situation Is Considered Better.

Catania, March 30.—Mount Etina is somewhat more active. The moderation of the eruption Sunday allowed of some solidification of the lava and the new streams are therefore moving more slowly than those which first flowed from the crater. While the fields and the vineyards have been greatly damaged, none of the villages are now threatened.

MORE PAY FOR TROLLEYMEN

New England Investment Company Offers Increase in Wages.

New Haven, Conn., March 30.—An offer of an increase in wages has been made to the 3000 trolley men on lines owned by the Connecticut company and on the lines of the New England Investment & Securities company in Massachusetts. The men will vote upon the acceptance of the offer.

LOBBY PROBE FOR CONGRESS

Charges of Corrupt Influences in Favor of Subsidies to be Investigated.

Washington, March 30.—The House yesterday passed a resolution for an investigation of charges that a lobby was maintained in Washington by shipping interests to corruptly influence members of the House in favor of ship subsidy legislation.

NEW YORK "SOLON'S" PRICE

Six Senators Offered at \$500 Each.

KINGSLEY TELLS OF OFFER

Buckley Made Demands—Insurance Commissioner Hotchkiss Through with Lawyer—Will Try to Have Him Disbarred.

New York, March 30.—President Darwin P. Kingsley of the New York Life Insurance company and James H. McInnes, general solicitor for that company, came down to yesterday morning's session of the insurance graft inquiry prepared to administer a coup de grace to William H. Buckley, the lobbyist, whose letters have been telling when his memory has failed how he fixed things for the fire insurance interests at Albany. It was a crushing blow for Buckley, because he had been in the retainer of the New York Life since 1908, and was virtually a member of the life insurance "yellow dog" organization, of which Mr. Kingsley's father-in-law, John H. McColl, was the executive manager.

The charge that Mr. Kingsley made was that in the spring of 1906, when he had succeeded in having the vital public utility clause stricken out of the section of the insurance law relating to the election of trustees in mutual companies, Buckley met him on the street in Albany and told him that the action of the legislature was going to be reversed the next day. But Buckley said: "He had six votes that would save the situation and could deliver those votes for \$3,000." Mr. Kingsley declared that he told Buckley that he wouldn't pay "a damn cent."

This testimony by Mr. Kingsley, coming on top of indications of Monday that the probe of Superintendent Hotchkiss may enter the life, as well as the fire insurance companies, created more of a sensation than would be felt by the mere charge that Buckley offered to deliver six votes for \$500 each.

Buckley stepped down from the witness stand yesterday with a sigh of relief. Superintendent Hotchkiss of the state insurance department, after four days of grilling, had announced that he was through with him as a witness. The superintendent's next step will be an attempt to bring about his disbarment as a lawyer, on the strength of the testimony adduced at the hearing.

Just before the session adjourned, Mr. Hotchkiss demanded that the witness tell him how much he got from the insurance companies. Buckley was silent.

More of the letters exchanged between Buckley and the late George P. Sheldon, president of the Phoenix Fire Insurance company of Brooklyn, were introduced in evidence, and the tenor of some of them caused Mr. Hotchkiss to remark that it looked as if Buckley had attempted to tamper with the state insurance department under the Hotchkiss regime, after the removal of Otto Kelsey as superintendent of the department by Governor Hughes.

Mr. Hotchkiss explained that in April, 1908, an examination of the Phoenix had been ordered, but the order lay inactive in the New York office of the department, and finally was canceled in January, 1909, a short time before Hotchkiss assumed office. No man in the department except his head had the power to do such a thing, he explained. Otto Kelsey was Mr. Hotchkiss' predecessor.

On February 23, with Hotchkiss in office, Buckley wrote to Sheldon that a clerk in the department had told him that the Phoenix was to be examined soon.

"Who was the man at the New York end?" Mr. Hotchkiss asked. Buckley refused to tell.

The letters from 1905 to date were comparatively few; there were enough, however, to show that Buckley and Sheldon kept up their relations.

Just before the election of 1908, Buckley wrote: "If it is your intention to do anything for the men here in Saratoga and in New York, it will have to be done within the next day or two."

He was asked by Hotchkiss if this did not refer to a plan for making contributions to the campaign expenses of Senators Grattan, Brackett and Grady. He would not discuss it.

MAY TIE UP CANADA ROADS

Strike of Mechanical Force on C. P. R. R. and Northern Fears.

Toronto, March 30.—A winning special to the Globe says:

A great strike of the federal mechanical trades on the Canadian Northern railroad and the Canadian Pacific railroad during the coming summer is one of the probabilities. The men have submitted a demand for an increase of 2 1/2 cents per hour all round. Canadian Pacific railroad mechanics have decided unanimously to stand firm for the schedule. The Canadian Northern railroad men met last night. Should the strike occur, it would probably be a fight to a finish as the unions are better prepared than two years ago.

TARIFF ACT APPROVED

French Chamber of Deputies Unanimously Adopts Agreement.

Paris, March 30.—The bill approving the Franco-American tariff agreement was adopted unanimously yesterday by the chamber of deputies. The sole objection to the measure was raised by M. Antonine Jourde, Radical-Socialist, on the ground that the United States could discontinue the minimum concession at any time upon three months' notice being given of her intention so to do. However, Minister of Commerce Dupuy explained that both countries were on the same footing in this respect, the right to break the agreement after due notice being reciprocal.

JEFF BREAKS AN ARM

Persistent Rumors to That Effect Circulated in Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Calif., March 30.—Persistent rumors that J. J. Jeffries, who is now hunting in the San Bernardino Mountains, had met with a mishap, were circulated in Los Angeles yesterday. According to reports, the former champion had fallen off a rough mountain road and broken his arm.

Inquiry in sporting circles and at the home of Jeffries failed to bring any verification of the report and it was set down by the big fellow's friends as a senseless canard. Mrs. Jeffries said that she had received no word from her husband.

UNITED STATES MODEL NATION

King Frederick Tells Minister Egan What He Thinks of Us.

Copenhagen, March 30.—King Frederick declared yesterday that the United States was the model for all nations. This expression was made to American Minister Egan, who, having recently returned to the Danish capital, was received in audience by his majesty. Mr. Egan brought a personal message to the king from President Taft. During a conversation of nearly an hour, the Danish monarch exhibited an intelligent acquaintance with and deep sympathy in American affairs. During this audience Mrs. Egan and Miss Egan were received by the queen.

POLICE "PERNICIOUSLY ACTIVE"

Two of New York Force Are Ordered Dismissed.

New York, March 30.—Because Mayor Gaynor thought that the motives of two self-constituted excise raiders in the persons of policemen Thomas Keenan and John F. Cunningham might be disinterested, the men were charged with charges of violations of the law. Police Commissioner Keenan found guilty by Trial Deputy Commissioner Walsh and their dismissal recommended.

WILL DISCLOSE TARIFF DEAL

Announcement of Arrangement with Canada To-day.

Washington, March 30.—It was officially stated yesterday that the announcement of the tariff agreement with Canada would be made to-day at noon in Ottawa and at the state department simultaneously. The terms of the agreement will be withheld until that time.

VOTES FOR INCOME TAX

Mississippi Legislature Adopts Resolution Favoring Amendment.

Jackson, Miss., March 30.—The Mississippi legislature had adopted a resolution favoring the income tax amendment to the constitution of the United States. The resolution was enrolled yesterday.

QUIT WORK AT FRANKLIN, N. H.

Some of Regular Machine Tenders Dissatisfied with Strike-Breakers.

Franklin, N. H., March 30.—Considerable surprise was caused at the mills of the International Paper company here yesterday, when several of the regular machine-tenders of the day shift did not appear at their places at the time the men of the second night shift quit work. Two of the paper-making machines in mill B were forced to stop running for a short while, but were finally started again when the foreman of the mill induced the night men to return to work and finish the stock that was in the machine. At a meeting Sunday the machine-tenders refused by vote to join the strike of the pulp mill workers now in progress.

It was thought that there would be no further strike here, but it is understood that a number of the machine-tenders talked the situation over during the night and early yesterday and some of them decided not to go back to work at the mills. No reason was given for this action, but it was stated that the men are dissatisfied with the strike-breakers, who take the place of the helpers. The machine-tenders are all skilled laborers.

COAL STRIKE IMMINENT

Great Industrial War Seems to be Almost Certain.

Cincinnati, March 30.—A declaration of an industrial war of great extent and severity seemed but a few hours away yesterday, when the delegates of 300,000 union miners of the United States met yesterday afternoon to outline their course as a result of the sine die adjournment, without agreement, of the joint conference of miners and operators of Ohio, Indiana and western Pennsylvania.

The adjournment was taken following an all morning discussion and just after President Thomas L. Lewis of the United Mine Workers of North America had declared: "When the miners go into this conflict it will be a fight to a finish."


