NELLIE BLY FIRE HEROINE.
Mrs. Seaman Helps Men Engaged in Fighting Blaze.
New York, April 1.—The same spirit which enabled her, as "Nellie Bly," to make a record-breaking trip around the world, was displayed by Mrs. E. C. Seaman, when she rushed into the thick of the fight with a fireman to save the plant of the Ironclad Manufacturing company of Brooklyn, of which she is the executive head.
Mrs. Seaman, who is the widow of the founder of the plant, was in another part of the factory when the flames were discovered. She hurried through a courtyard and passageway, where sparks were falling thickly, to the receiving department building, which was afire, and then aided the firemen. The flames spread to a hospital adjoining, which happened to be free from patients. The factory was not damaged.

Spingardi; marine, Admiral Leonard; public instruction, Sig. Credaro; public works, Sig. Sarchi; agriculture, Sig. Raineri; posts and telegraphs, Sig. Cluffelli.
SIX KILLED IN EXPLOSION.
Disaster in Mine of Great Western Coal Company.
Wilburton, Okla., April 1.—An explosion in mine No. 2, of the Great Western Coal & Coke Co., here yesterday, killed six men.

COAL MINERS GO ON STRIKE
Three Hundred Thousand Men Walk Out
Demand Increase of Pay
Old Scale of Wages Expired with March and New One Not Yet Agreed to. Men Want Raise of Five Cents a Ton.
Pittsburg, Pa., April 1.—Three hundred thousand organized workers of the bituminous coal fields of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, quit work last night.
The miners members of the United Mine Workers of America, declared the walk-out was not a strike, but merely a suspension of work pending an arrangement between themselves and the operators of a wage scale for another year, the old scale having expired with the month of March.
The men demand an increase of pay in some instances of five cents a ton, and in other instances more, and certain changes in working conditions.
Confidence was expressed by the operators that there will be no general coal famine, large supplies of fuel having been secured in anticipation of the walkout.
While the miners predicted the suspension would be cut short by a prompt signing of wage scales, some of the operators maintained that the mines might be kept closed for a month or sixty days, or even longer.
The conditions in the various states are as follows:
Illinois, nine hundred mines closed and 75,000 quit; Indiana, 18,000 quit; Pennsylvania, approximately 40,000 men out; Iowa, every mine in Iowa closed pending settlement of the wage scale.
Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, comprising the southwestern interstate fields, 35,000 quit; Ohio, all miners quit. At Loraine, Ohio, one steel plant shut down and threw out 4,000 workmen, the managers announcing a shortage of coal.
The first victory for the men came in an announcement from Brazil, Indiana, the center of the Indiana black coal district, where it was announced the men's demands for a five-cent increase had been granted.

GAYNOR SHAKES UP POLICE
McCafferty no Longer Chief of Detectives
Other Changes Made
The Force's Graft Considerably Curtailed—This Is Sure to Be the Result of the Mayor's Excise Instructions.
New York, April 1.—The first move in the impending shake-up in the police department since Mayor Gaynor took over what is virtually a personal control of that branch of the city government came yesterday with the removal of Inspector James McCafferty from the head of the detective bureau, known as the central office, and the selection of Captain John H. Russell to succeed him. Captain Russell has been made acting inspector. Other changes were made in the department personnel, including the transferring of a number of captains. The shake-up follows Mayor Gaynor's order that the police shall make no excise arrests, and only obtain evidence which the mayor hopes will be the death blow to police blackmail. Meanwhile, New York is trying to determine whether Mayor Gaynor's order means a "dry" town or not.
Mayor Gaynor intimated yesterday in the strongest terms that he might ask the legislature, which, under the constitution, has the supervision of the conduct of judges and power to remove them, to consider the action of Supreme Court Justice Vernon M. Davis in appointing as a commissioner of estimate and appraisal in the Bronx Louis F. Haffen, the removed borough president.
"If the court does not substitute forthwith someone in place of Mr. Haffen," the mayor wrote to Corporation Counsel Watson yesterday, "I think it will be our duty to lay the matter before both houses of the legislature."
The mayor's letter struck right from the shoulder with language as vigorous as that employed by Mr. Watson Tuesday, when he wrote a letter of protest to the justice.
"We may as well have this matter out now once and for all," he said, in referring to the difficulties of city officials in cleaning out the scandal over large fees and great loss in condemnation proceedings.
Justice Davis named Mr. Haffen for the place on the condemnation commission several days ago. Inasmuch as in most of these cases the commissioners

are named by the courts as recommended by the corporation counsel, the assumption was that the selection of Haffen was due to Mr. Watson.
LONGBOAT LOST.
Beaten by Dorando in 20 Mile Race at Pittsburg.
Pittsburg, Pa., April 1.—Not more than 25 yards separated Dorando and Longboat at any point in a fast twenty-mile race at the Exposition hall last night and it was by that distance that

Longboat lost. Dorando's time was 1:54:8 2/5.
Dorando took the lead at the start but surrendered it to Longboat after the second mile and during the next five miles each lost it twice. In the seventh, however, Dorando regained it and held it to the finish.
