

MADE HITS COUNT WELL

Goddard Defeated Barre Independents, 5 to 3

THE GAME WAS EXCITING

Scampini Pitched Good Ball for the Town Team But Received Poor Support at Critical Times—Smith Was Hit Hard.

In a fast and exciting game played at Bangers' field yesterday afternoon, the Barre Independents went down to defeat before Goddard for the second time this season, the score being 5 to 3. The game was the deciding one of a series of three. Goddard secured one lone tally in the third, on a hit by Cosby, a sacrifice by Wishart, and a hit by Lee. Others came in the fourth, with bunched hits and a brace of errors by the Independents. The fifth tally, started by Lee's three-bagger, followed in the eighth inning. The Independents scored in the first on Heagle's hit, a sacrifice by Scampini and hits by R. Wright and Z. Wright. Maiden's two-bagger and hits by McKenzie and Duncan in the fourth were responsible for two more.

Scampini pitched good ball for the Independents, but received rather poor support at critical times. Goddard's victory was largely due to timely hitting, when hits meant runs. A clean three-bagger by Lee in the eighth, a double play pulled off by Priest and Tinkham in the eighth for Goddard, and Scampini pitching for the Independents featured the game. The score:—

CLAIMS "CONNY MACK" AS FRIEND.

East Brookfield Man Said to Have Tried to Pass Forged Check.

Boston, May 20.—Uttering a check for \$100 to which the name of Cornelius McGillicuddy, the Philadelphia baseball magnate had been forged, is the charge which the police have placed against George E. McDonald. He appeared at the National Shawmut bank before it was opened yesterday and wanted to have the check cashed. As soon as the officers of the bank arrived they became suspicious and notified police headquarters. Two inspectors were sent to the bank and they placed the man under arrest. McDonald claimed that he was George Terence Sheridan and that he was personally acquainted with McGillicuddy ever since they were boys together at East Brookfield, where McDonald now lives. He said the police alleged that he had been had pressed for money, had written to the baseball man for some cash and that he had received this check. When asked where McGillicuddy was at the present time the man said that he might be in Philadelphia, Chicago or here, as far as he knew. The police finally got him to admit, they say, that his name was not Sheridan, but McDonald. McDonald waived examination in the municipal court and was held in \$2000 for the grand jury.

GOOD FLIGHT IN FRANCE.

Aviator Takes Passenger Thirty Miles Across Country.

Mourmelon-La-Grand, France, May 20.—M. Schoups flew in a biplane with a passenger to Chalons-Sur-Marne and return, a total distance of about thirty miles, yesterday, at a speed of 40 1/2 miles an hour.

DEMOCRATS URGE NEW STATES.

Action Insisted Upon as a Consideration for Any Concessions.

Washington, May 20.—Negotiations between the regular Republicans and the Democrats regarding the railroad bill were pending when the Senate convened yesterday on practically the same basis as at the time of adjournment Wednesday night, except that the statehood question was being more prominently mentioned than it did Wednesday. Senators Hughes and Bailey were pressing the necessity for the passage of the statehood bill as a consideration for any concessions that might be made on the railroad measure and the Democrats generally were disposed to take up next after the disposal of the pending measure. Some Republicans were not willing to go so far. When the bill was taken up Mr. Cummins presented his amendment to the section of the bill regulating commerce commission of all increases in rates before they take effect. The Iowa senator spoke in support of the provision.

MURDER AND SUICIDE.

Double Crime Brought to Light at Danvers, Mass.

Danvers, Mass., May 20.—A probable murder, followed by an attempt at suicide, was brought to light yesterday afternoon. Daniel S. Doherty, a motor-man employed by the Boston & Northern Street Railway company, drank four ounces of nitric acid and is expected to die. A search of his home disclosed the body of Mrs. Beatrice Rice, his housekeeper, lying on the floor, a clothesline noose around her neck and the end tied to a door knob. The room in which Mrs. Rice's body was found showed traces of a terrible struggle and it was from the appearance of this room that the authorities were led to believe that Doherty had strangled the woman before taking the poison.

MORE GOODS FOUND.

Additional Durable Commodities in Rollins' Trunks, Says Smyth.

New York, May 20.—The examination of all the trunks of former Governor Frank W. Rollins of New Hampshire who, with his wife and son, was arrested recently on arrival here from Europe, for smuggling, was completed yesterday and it was learned from a customs officer that additional amounts of durable goods were found. Deputy Surveyor Smyth said yesterday afternoon: "The remaining six of the nine trunks brought into the country by Mr. Rollins have been examined. Some durable goods have been found, the amount and the character of which I am not at liberty to say."

Mr. Rollins, with his wife and son, will be examined before United States Commissioner Shields this afternoon.

AUSTIN'S BILL GOES OVER.

Many Protests Against Prohibition of Transportation of Prison-Made Goods.

Washington, May 20.—The house committee on interstate and foreign commerce has decided to postpone until next winter consideration of the bill of Representative Austin of Tennessee, to prohibit the transportation in interstate commerce of prison-made goods. Since the bill was introduced protests against it have poured in so heavily that the committee believes it wise to move slowly in the matter. The Davis Shoe company of Massachusetts, which operates prison factories in Virginia, is among the remonstrants.

BRYAN GOING TO SCOTLAND.

LABOR CONDITIONS.

Senate Orders Investigation at All Steel Plants.

Washington, May 20.—The Senate yesterday directed the commissioner of labor to make a searching investigation of labor conditions in every steel plant in the United States and report to Congress. A resolution directing the investigation was introduced by Senator Borah of Idaho and passed yesterday without a dissenting vote. Wednesday Senator Borah held a conference with Secretary Nagel of the department of commerce and labor. The resolution directs the secretary of commerce and labor to instruct Commissioner Neill to investigate conditions of labor employed in the steel plants, wages paid, hours, overtime and every phase of the employment.

NEW BRAZILIAN AMBASSADOR.

Domicio Da Gama, Now at Buenos Ayres, Will Come to Washington.

Washington, May 20.—Domicio Da Gama, at present minister of Brazil to the Argentine Republic, will be appointed ambassador to the United States. No official announcement on the subject has been made, but there is little doubt that such is the fact.

SPAIN EXPECTANT.

Stork Not Due, Though, Until After the King's Return.

London, May 20.—A dispatch from Madrid to the Central News says the physicians in attendance upon Queen Ena now state that her accouchement is not expected until after King Alfonso's return from London. The previous diagnosis was incorrect.
