## About the State

Hon. Charles H. Darling, collector of customs, of Burlington, has been engaged as Memorial day orator at Keosauqua Falls.

President John M. Thomas, of Middlebury college, was one of the speakers at the banquet of the Chicago alumni of Middlebury college Tuesday evening.

Rollin L. Richmond, of Rutland has announced his candidacy for the position of city representative. Mr. Richmond is an ex-mayor of Rutland and a pharmacist.

Barbara Collins, the two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Collins, of St. Johnsbury, swallowed an open safety pin Sunday. It is probable that it will have to be located by X-ray.

Some of the property owners in the vicinity of Rutland have adopted the novel method of photographing fisherman caught whipping posted streams, the pictures to be used as evidence against them.

Mrs. William A. Denmore injured one side, cracked her ribs and, it is feared, was injured internally when she fell from a step ladder while cleaning her house in Lyndonville and struck on the side of a bath tub.

Several men from Maine have purchased mills in Lunenburg and will rebuild the old pulp mill, put in a new dam and dynamo and establish a large pulp business there, which will employ from 75 to 100 men.

Morrisville has been considerably troubled lately by a chicken thief, and poultry fanciers in that vicinity are gratified to know that the culprit, an owl, measuring four feet nine inches from tip to tip, has been caught. Many chickens had been stolen.

Mrs. Jane Jones, probably the oldest woman in Northfield, died Wednesday evening, May 11, at her home at Northfield Center after a long illness. Mrs. Jones was the widow of Henry Jones. She was born in Northfield over 90 years ago and had always lived in that town.

Hearing someone in the room over where she was working at her home in Wells River last week, Mrs. Hiramman went to investigate, when she saw a man leaving the house with her husband's gun and coat. Help was called, which finally overtook the man and, after two trials, he was taken to jail at Chelsea.

Ed. Cone met with a serious accident last week at the Eagle Square works in South Shaftsbury where he is fireman. One of the workmen had thrown a glass globe into the furnace, under the boiler. Mr. Cone, without knowing what had been done, opened the furnace door to put in more fuel, when the globe exploded, sending a shower of hot glass into his face. One eye is in a bad condition.

Sam Petrosel, an Italian, appeared before Judge F. G. Swinerton, at Rutland Tuesday, charged with simple assault and paid his fine of \$20 and costs. On April 2 in a street fracas following a dance at which Petrosel and another Italian had words with some Americans, Petrosel stabbed William Melachini, a young man, in the chest with a knife. The Italian stabbed the wrong man, thinking the boy had been tormenting him.

### JOHN A. KASSON

One of Nation's Best Rounded Men in Past 60 Years.

John Adam Kasson, who has died at the age of 88, was one of the best rounded, the most satisfying of our public men in the last 60 years. He was no doubt most remarkable as a legislator and debater, but he had also great ability as an administrative official, and his service in diplomacy was important. In all his lines of activity, the same characteristics of high and constant principle, thorough knowledge and unflinching capacity, faithful pursuance of duty and the patriotic virtue of regard for the people above the party, were manifested. He possessed the gift of eloquence as well as the acquirement of argument. Indeed he belonged to the stately school of clear headed and deep hearted statesmen and stateswomen, all to the present day of corporation influence, and the narrowing effect of partisan ascendancy which does not always pay true regard to the interests of the whole people. Mr. Kasson left public life of his own will because of the blind refusal of Congress to enact those treaties of reciprocity between the United States and other American republics which he had negotiated for mutual advantage. He was utterly disgusted with the official career. He was in private life what he was in public service—honorable, sincere and trustworthy—Springfield Republican.

## THOMAS CRAVEN CHARGED WITH STEALING RAILROAD PASS.

Rutland, May 20.—At the May session of United States court, opened at Windsor Tuesday afternoon, the case of United States against Thomas Craven, a former mail clerk working between this city and Boston, was not pressed. The case was given one hearing before this court in this city last October and the jury disagreed after a three days trial.

Mr. Craven was arrested on an indictment charging him with the theft of a railroad pass, such as is used by the railway mail clerks when not on duty. The testimony introduced by the government tended to show that Mr. Craven had changed the date and name on the face of the document and forwarded it to his brother in Philadelphia, Pa., and at the time it was picked up by government officials it was in the hands of an employe of his brother.

Mr. Craven denied all connection with the affair.

## NATIVE OF BURKE, VT.

Arthur Elmer Denison died in Cambridge, Mass.

Boston, May 20.—Arthur Elmer Denison, at one period of his career associated with Edward Everett in the practice of law, died at his home in Arlington street, Cambridge, Wednesday night. He was born at Burke, Vt., sixty-two years ago, and his parents were Lucius and Adeline (Hobart) Denison. The family soon afterwards moved to Norway, Me., and from there Mr. Denison enlisted in the Civil war, but he did not see service at the front. The family then moved to Cambridge, Mass., where Mr. Denison went to Tufts college, from which he was graduated in 1869.

Again moving to Norway, Mr. Denison organized the Norway National bank, of which he was cashier for several years. He studied law with William Verrill Virgin, who later became one of the justices of the supreme court of Maine. Mr. Denison came to Boston and opened a law office in a home in Pemberton square, the site of which is now occupied by the Pemberton building, and for a time he was associated there with Edward Everett.

Mr. Denison was married to Miss Ida Wright, daughter of Dr. Ward K. Wright of Cambridge. She and one son, Arthur W. Denison, survived. Mr. Denison was vice-president and treasurer of the Massachusetts Mutual Accident association, a trustee of Tufts college, and chairman of the board of trustees of the North Avenue Universalist church of Cambridge. He was affiliated with the Masonic fraternity and had served on numerous civic committees in Cambridge.
