Removing the Maine.
Removing the battleship Maine by piecemeal, simply for the purpose of clearing Havana harbor of an obstruction is a very different matter from the patriotic purpose of raising it from its muddy bed and giving the remains of its dead sailors decent burial. It will never be satisfactory, if such a course is eventually decided upon, and there should be such an indignant protest that the suggestion will be dropped and forgotten. It will be remembered that Congress at first appropriated one hundred thousand dollars for the raising of the Maine, but army engineers promptly and positively asserted that such a sum was wholly inadequate. Finally Congress appropriated three hundred thousand dollars, and it is expected that when Congress meets in December experts will be ready to report whether the appropriation will be sufficient to do the work. Of course, if the wreck is to be removed by piecemeal, the appropriation is more than enough, but if a coffee dam is to be built around the vessel, it is probable that the dam will cost more than the appropriation. If the experts shall find that a bigger appropriation is needed, it should be promptly voted by Congress and the work carried forward. It has already been treated with a neglect which amounts to a national disgrace, and the time has come when the people of the country should insist upon the doing of a thorough job, and one which will show the facts relative to the sinking of the ill-fated ship exactly as they are. It was a popular war cry in the spring of 1898, "Remember the Maine," but Congress has seemed disposed to forget her in the year that has intervened.—Manchester Union.

SEAVER'S NOMINATION MADE UNANIMOUS
Williamstown Man Won Contest for Republican Candidate for Senator
In Orange County.
Chelsea, July 5.—The Orange county Republican convention was held at this place, Saturday and was called to order at 10:30 a. m. by David S. Conant, chairman of the county committee, and prayer was offered by Rev. John A. Lawrence. After the reading of the call by Secretary H. K. Darling, Chairman Conant announced the temporary organization as follows: Frank S. Williams of Bradford, chairman, and Frank L. Brigham of Bradford and W. H. Sprague of Chelsea, secretaries, which organization was made permanent.
Lewis M. Seaver of Williamstown was nominated as a candidate for senator from the west side over Raymond P. Lord of Orange by forty majority, and his nomination was made unanimous. Benjamin B. Scribner of Corinth was nominated without opposition as senator from the east side. Warren L. Crafts of Bradford was nominated without opposition for assistant judge from the east side to succeed Horace White of Topsham, whose second term of office will expire on Dec. 1, and who, during his incumbency, has been a strong and faithful official. Dana H. Morse of Randolph was nominated to succeed himself as assistant judge from the west side, having served in that capacity but one term and during which he has greatly added to his large circle of friends and admirers throughout the county.
George L. Stow of Chelsea was nominated without a dissenting voice to succeed himself as judge of probate for the Randolph district, and Benjamin F. Baldwin of Wells River the present sheriff of the county, was nominated for judge of probate for the Bradford district to succeed Samuel M. Gleason of Tipton, who has held the office for the past thirty or more years to the pleasure and satisfaction of his constituency, and who by reason of his impaired health and the infirmities of age deemed it unwise to burden himself longer with the duties of the office and hence was not a candidate for renomination.
Stanley C. Wilson of Chelsea, who during the past two years has held the office of state's attorney and who has sustained the high standard that his predecessors in office have maintained and enjoyed and whose administration has been eminently satisfactory to the citizens of the county, was renominated without opposition.
Benjamin H. Adams of Chelsea, who has been one of the most efficient deputy sheriffs in the county for the past sixteen years, was nominated without opposition for the office of sheriff, and Wm. E. Winstony of Washington, who has also been an efficient deputy sheriff of the county for a quarter of a century, was nominated high bailiff and he will succeed the late Steven E. Darling of Vershire, who had held this office for twenty years or more.
Following the nomination of this strong list of candidates for county offices, the following county committee was elected for the two years ensuing: D. S. Conant, Bradford; Edward H. Nichols, Braintree; Charles A. Bigelow, Brookfield; Hale K. Darling, Chelsea; Pearl H. Darling, Corinth; Frank W. Pierce, Fairlee; Frank George, Newbury; John B. Emerson, Orange; Dana H. Morse, Randolph; James S. Morrill, Stafford; C. S. Wilcox, Tipton; G. H. Hight, Topsham; Millard T. King, Tunbridge; K. Frank Fuller, Vershire; A. E. Whitcomb, Washington; John N. Kimball West Fairlee, and Lewis M. Seaver, Williamstown.

After the convention adjourned, the county committee organized by electing the following officers: David S. Conant, chairman; Hale K. Darling, secretary and treasurer; Dana H. Morse, James S. Morrill and Lewis M. Seaver, executive committee.

A County Exhibit.
The important announcement is made by officials of the Vermont State Fair association, that it again offers the sum of \$150 as a prize for the best county exhibit of apples at the coming state fair in White River Junction, Sept. 21-24. The prize last year is divided \$75 to the first, \$50 second, and \$25, third. This prize is certainly one of the best offered by the association in any class, for it is calculated to foster apple growing in all sections of the state and give practical illustration of possibilities throughout its territory. Another good thing about this county show, is that it will be honestly made, for it does not afford that opportunity for fraud and deception so common in all classes of exhibits at the Vermont state fair, a condition that is a disgrace to the fair and the people of the state. This proposed county exhibit of apples can and should be made a valued and far reaching advertisement of the state and the state press is in duty bound to do all in its power to foster and aid the enterprise to the end of an advertisement of the state. Let each county in the state do its level best to win the first prize for if this is done the exhibit as a whole will be a grand one, and each respective county will have exceptional opportunity to give a practical demonstration as to its possibilities in apple culture.—White River Junction Landmark.
