Native strawberries have been selling for eight cents a quart in Rutland.

The steamer, Lady of the Lake, began Monday her regular trips for the season on Lake Memphremagog.

George Gallup, 12 years old, was drowned June 24 near his home in Granby by slipping into a deep hole while on a fishing trip with another boy. The body was recovered.

Marion Denison of West Arlington stepped upon a rusty nail recently and it penetrated her foot, coming out on top. It is feared that it may prove serious as she suffers intensely from the effects.

John Rayome, who fell 35 feet Tuesday at Addison Junction, N. Y., and was brought to the Rutland hospital, has remained unconscious most of the time since the accident, but hopes of his recovery are still entertained.

Bennington is the banner town for strawberries this year, the Bennington Banner reporting two baskets of them, heaped, one of which contained only 17 berries and the other 10. Some of the berries were 7 1/2 inches in circumference.

A driving horse belonging to Mrs. Julia Jenkins is missing from the pasture in Rutland, and it is thought that the animal was stolen, as it was traced for a short distance, where by marks on the ground it looked as if the animal had been hitched to a vehicle.

Burlington is to have an automobile truck, 68 horsepower, to be used by the fire department. It will carry a crew of ten men and in addition to a chemical tank of 40 gallons, 1,000 feet of hose and 250 feet of chemical hose. There are dual tires, so that if one breaks the trip can be made on the others.

Fire at the quarry of the Mahar brothers in Fair Haven, Wednesday night, caused a loss of about \$1,000, not covered by insurance. The blacksmith shop, a state shanty and a new derrick which had been completed that day were destroyed, and it is thought that the fire was incendiary. The plant was shut down to await the erection of a new derrick.

Mrs. Almira H. Washburn, who died June 27 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. T. W. D. Worthen, in Hanover, N. H., in her 94th year of her age, was the widow of Gov. Peter T. Washburn of Woodstock, executive of this state in 1869. Since the marriage of her daughter, in 1885, she had lived with her. Mrs. Washburn was oldest member of the Woodstock Congregational church.

A Rutland bicyclist had an escape from a serious accident only through the prompt action of the chauffeur of an automobile into which he ran. The auto was going at a slow rate of speed and the boy, in attempting to avoid the machine, evidently lost his head and steered straight for it. The brake was applied to the auto and the boy, although hurled to the ground, was unhurt. The bicycle was wrecked.

Mrs. John L. Baker was drowned recently at her home in Rochester under peculiar circumstances. She took a large tin pail and went to a water barrel for water, and it is supposed that, in attempting to lift the heavy pail, she was struck with a heart weakness to which she was subject, for she was soon found with her head and hands submerged, and efforts to revive her proved unavailing. She was born in Granville.

Otis D. Barrett of Charendon, who recently returned from a two years' stay in Africa, under the educational department of the Portugal government, had the degree of bachelor of science in agriculture conferred on him at the commencement exercises of the university of Vermont at Burlington this week. He was a graduate of that college in the class of 1890. Mr. Barrett has taken a commission to do similar work for the United States government in the Philippines.

At a special village meeting in St. Johnsbury, Tuesday evening, June 28, it was voted that the village trustees be directed to "discontinue the supplying of river water to every person and to every corporation for every purpose and place where it can be drunk, intentionally or unintentionally, the same to take effect not later than September 1, 1910. A motion that the streets be laid was also carried, after considerable sparring, 68 votes for and 67 against being cast.

On invitation of Col. T. W. Jones, commandant at Fort Ethan Allen, Gov. G. H. Prouty and staff reviewed the troops at the post Wednesday. This was the first review since the arrival of the 10th, and the opportunity of seeing one of the crack regiments of the army in review was taken by a large number of people from nearby towns. The review was pronounced to be the finest seen by the spectators, and the courtesy shown to the governor was marked.
