SRICKEN AT FUNERAL.

Canon Reed Died at Keene, N. H., Yesterday Afternoon.

Keene, N. H., Aug. 11.—J. Carleton Reed, aged about 58 years and for many years a member of the firm of J. Mason Reed, box manufacturers, died suddenly yesterday afternoon, while attending the funeral of his cousin, Miss Florence S. Spalter. Mr. Reed had been a sufferer from Bright's disease for several years and it was thought that the strain of the funeral proved too great, although he appeared in his usual condition of late. Mr. Reed was seen to gasp or breathe while in the room and he was removed to the piazza but died in the way, death being almost instantaneous.

Robert Treat Paine Dying.

Boston, Aug. 11.—Robert Treat Paine, philanthropist, and president of the American Peace society, lies at the point of death at his home in Waltham.

Mr. Paine has been slowly sinking since last week, when he suffered a shock of paralysis. He is 75 years of age and a great-grandson of Roberts Treat Paine, who signed the declaration of independence.

DASHED TO EARTH

But Walter Brookins Escaped Death, Though Painfully Hurt.

Asbury Park, N. J., Aug. 11.—A serious mishap to Walter Brookins, in which the daring Wright aviator was painfully, but not dangerously hurt, marred the opening day of the aviation meet here. Brookins was dashed to the earth when his machine suddenly turned turtle after he had been forced to swerve suddenly to avoid crashing into a crowd of spectators. Seven other persons among whom the machine tumbled, were more or less seriously injured.

Brookins was pinned under the wreckage and was only half conscious when friends reached him. This started a report that he had been fatally injured. An examination showed that his nose was broken and that he had been badly bruised and shaken up, but not seriously hurt.

The mishap was due to the thronging of spectators out onto the field. Brookins in descending had no room to operate the machine, and was driven to make a sudden turn to avoid crashing among the watchers. The tricky wind caught the machine and sent it spinning over backwards.

The machine tumbled amid a small crowd of watchers, mostly boys. One youngster was rushed to a hospital, where it was reported that he had a fracture of the skull. Six other youths were less seriously hurt.
