

About the State

H. F. Bean was fatally injured August 17 at Morgan Center by falling from a load of hay. He never regained consciousness.

Colonel F. D. Hale, United States consul, leaves Lunenburg this week with his wife for a short visit in Maine before sailing for Trinidad.

Merritt B. Morgan of Bennington will represent Vermont at the meeting of the International Order of Good Templars at Niagara Falls this week.

Cora Austin, the four-year-old granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Adelbert Austin of Lowell, nearly amputated one of her fingers with an ice axe last week.

The Baptist church at Wallingford has extended a call to Rev. Mr. Sykes of Rochester, N. Y., who has occupied the pulpit for the past two weeks. Mr. Sykes has accepted and will begin his duties in about two weeks.

Rev. W. A. Pollock handed in his resignation as pastor of the United Presbyterian church in South Ryegate Sunday, this resignation to take effect on September 1. Mr. Pollock will go to Omaha, Neb., as pastor of the Mission church there.

The pear crop is almost a record one in the vicinity of Bennington this year. The trees are burdened with fruit of good size and free from insect stings. The Flemish Beauty is the most common. The indications point to a low price for fruit.

The Rev. Dr. C. S. Butler of Boston has been secured as pastor of the Methodist church in Enosburg Falls, where he will begin work September 1. He was a former pastor at St. Albans and at one time district superintendent.

One hundred and six colonies of bees, belonging to W. F. Grover of New Haven, yielded 4,800 pounds of honey, while Mr. Crane of Middlebury, the largest bee keeper in New England, is said to have thirty tons of honey ready for the market.

The second clam bake for the benefit of the Brightloom hospital fund will be held on Labor day, September 5, at St. Johnsbury. There will be speeches by Governor George H. Prouty, Congressman Frank Plumley and others. In case of rain, the clam bake will be held on the first fair day.

Cleveland Lynde of Brattleboro broke the small bone at the end of his spine recently, when the chair in which he was sitting went over backward. He was taken to the Farren-Memorial hospital in Montague, Mass., where it was found that the injury will prove troublesome for some time.

The slate finishing plant of D. Hogan & Son at Fair Haven was entirely destroyed by fire early Wednesday morning. The fire department could do little on account of the intense heat from burning varnishes and oils. The loss is placed at \$3,000, largely covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Good progress is being made on the preliminary work for the big new boiler house which the Rutland railroad is constructing just south of the repair shops in Rutland. About 25 men are at work on the job and the outside foundation walls are already in position. As the new structure is on the site of the old boiler house, the foundations of the building, which was razed 15 years ago, is encountered in digging and the excavation will be a difficult task.

The hotel at Concord was raided Saturday when the sheriff and ten or a dozen deputies appeared on the scene and proceeded to search the place for liquor. A barrel of beer and three dozen quarts of whiskey and gin were found. The officers had warrants for Daniel Grout, the proprietor, and his son, George Grout, but the latter was out of town. The liquor was claimed to belong to him. At a hearing Monday, bail was fixed at \$500 and the case continued to county court at Guildhall.

John Anderson, the farmer who was killed by the cars at North Hero last Tuesday, was a half brother of George Todhope of Alburg Center, and was born April 1, 1846. He had two brothers and it is a singular fact that all the male members of the family were killed by accidents. His father was drowned, one of his brothers, when a little fellow going to school, was lifted up by the hair of his head and otherwise maltreated and he died. His other brother was kicked on the knee by a horse and blood poison killed him. Now John was struck by a train going 40 miles an hour and killed. He left three half brothers, two sisters and three half sisters.

The residents of Sutton were noted for their loyalty, among of the oldest being Barton Esterbrooks, who was 92 years old Wednesday and is in good health. Mrs. Betsey Foster will be 100 years old in October and is out of doors on pleasant days, enjoying good health. Mrs. Rebecca Bartlett is in her 94th year and works about the house, as she wishes to do. Mrs. Harriet Clark, 87 years of age next November, never threads her needle and does some of the work about the house every day.

August 30, 1910, by the property committee (leaving same at the city clerk's office) of the city of Barre, Vt., for digging a cellar, putting in cellar walls and grading around same, and for cementing the cellar floor. The work to be done on a lot owned by the city of Barre, Vt., on Brook street, upon which the Mertz house will be moved. The walls will be built of concrete and will be one foot thick at the bottom and will batter to ten inches thick at the top. The city of Barre will furnish the cement and allow the use of sand and gravel from its sand and gravel banks nearby. The cement floor will be one and one-half inches thick and the material for said floor and the walls shall be mixed at such proportions as the city engineer shall designate. Bids must give prices per cubic yard for the concrete, per square yard for the cellar floor, and per cubic yard for the grading. The excess of material needed for the grading after using what is obtained from digging the cellar may be taken from the bank adjacent to the lot, excepting a top layer of loam one foot deep, which the contractor shall obtain from elsewhere. Measurements will be made in place by the city engineer and work must be done to his satisfaction.
