

The same device was used in lifting the second wagon, and no damage resulted from the accident. It is expected that the bridge will be as good as new in a few days, as a heavy covering of planks will be placed on the structure. It was thought that the bridge had been reinforced with concrete at the time of its construction, so that little attention was paid to the decayed condition of the superstructure. Examination proved that such was not the case, and repairs followed at once.
