MANUEL REACHES ENGLAND.

Exiled Monarch Received by Ex-Portuguese Ambassador.

Plymouth, Eng., Oct. 21.—The royal yacht Victoria and Albert arrived here at seven o'clock Wednesday evening, bringing King Manuel and Queen Mother Amelie from Gibraltar. The duke of Orleans, Marquis de Soveral, Portuguese minister, and Senor Villa y Urrutia, the Spanish ambassador, welcomed the royal exiles, who at once left on a special train for Wood Norton.

CHOLERA SPREADS IN ITALY.

Seventeen Deaths Wednesday and Total of Thirty-seven New Cases.

Rome, Oct. 21.—Official reports on the cholera situation indicate an increase in the spread of the disease. During the past twenty-four hours, thirty-seven new cases developed. Three of those occurred in the province of Bari, nineteen in the province of Caserta, of which fourteen are among the insane patients; thirteen in the province of Naples; one in the province of Salerno, and one in the city of Rome. Seventeen deaths occurred during the same period, eight of them in the province of Naples.
