PROCLAMATION! Our Overcoats

To the Freemen of the State of Vermont, by John A. Mead, Governor.

Whereas, by the proclamation issued by me, the governor of the state of Vermont, on the 20th day of October, 1910, the hunting season was suspended. And whereas it appears to me that the reasons for such suspension have ceased to exist, now, therefore, by the authority vested in me as governor of the state of Vermont, I do hereby and by this proclamation reopen the hunting season so closed in so far as it relates to the hunting of all kinds of game except deer, and I do hereby make and declare the 31st day of October, 1910, and ending and including the 5th day of November, 1910, an open season for the hunting of deer.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto subscribed my name and caused the great seal of the state to be affixed.

Done at the executive chamber at Montpelier this 27th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and ten, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and thirty-fifth.
