



Vermont Academy's Work.

As a school for boys alone Vermont academy is doing excellent work, and the bright prospects of the Saxtons River institution proved beyond a doubt the wisdom of its management in giving up the co-educational plan. The modern system of education with its trend toward practical training, makes the maintenance of special courses for both boys and girls too expensive for a school of Vermont academy's size and endowment, say nothing of other reasons against the co-educational idea. Under its present policy Vermont academy bids fair to take advantage of an enlarged opportunity in the educational field by reason of increased facilities along definite and well chosen lines. And in its president, Rev. George B. Lawson, formerly of Brattleboro, it has a leader thoroughly capable of meeting the situation in a way to accomplish the results most to be desired.—Brattleboro Reformer.
