THE WORK OF THE LEGISLATURE.


Two days ago Speaker Howe of the House, in reminding the representatives of their work, reported that 474 bills had been introduced in the House and that 144 of them had been reported on by the committees, leaving 330 measures still in the hands of the committees. Since that report, many additional bills have been introduced, and at the same time there have been some reports on those already received, so that the number remaining is practically the same as reported by the speaker two days ago. The tabulation indicates that there is a great deal of work ahead of the legislators when they resume their session after the Thanksgiving recess. Many of the bills remaining in the committees may be grouped and, if found meritorious, may be combined in a comprehensive measure, and thus the clutter will be decreased somewhat, but having no appreciable effect on the great mass. Therefore, it means that at once on their return to Montpelier the members will need to attack their committee work earnestly and digest the accumulation of bills which now lie in their pigeon-holes, reporting their conclusions to the House; and the same thing applies to the Senate, although less forcefully, as the Senate, being a less unworldly body, moves more rapidly. The good name which the 1910 legislature has gained for itself thus far will be lost if the members fail to complete their work before the Christmas holidays. At present there seems to be no reason why they cannot by diligent attention to business wind up the session before that time and still leave a record of which they need not be ashamed.
