

Words Attributed to Wendling, Alleged Murderer.

Louisville, Dec. 3.—"If I killed the little girl no one saw me but God, and He can't come down and testify."

With the testimony of Mr. Carey, chief of detectives of Louisville, that Joseph Wendling had made the foregoing statement immediately after his arrest in San Francisco, the prosecution in the trial of Wendling, who is charged with having murdered Alma Kellner, a child of 8, rested its case.


