Your Tuberculosis Bill.

A man of facts and figures in a Pennsylvania city recently computed that the illness and death of his child from scarlet fever, which she contracted in school, cost him \$377.50, while his or his neighbor's share in the prevention of this easily preventable disease would amount to only \$3.47. A similar calculation could be made in the case of tuberculosis.

Suppose a man, father of a family of three children, and earning \$3.00 a day, is taken sick with tuberculosis. What does it cost him to get well, and what would it cost each person in the United States to have prevented him from ever having had the disease? Here are a few of the leading items of expense to him in getting cured:

Six months' treatment in a sanatorium.....	\$250.00
Care, family of four, at \$8.00 per week, for six months.....	192.00
Loss of wages for six months, at \$3.00 per day.....	432.00
Total.....	\$874.00
