About the State

A. M. Goodspeed of Washington met with quite a serious accident while working in the woods Saturday. A limb fell from a tree, striking him on the head, cutting a serious gash, six inches long, also cutting the muscles in the back of his neck. The lacerations were sewed up and the patient was made as comfortable as possible. No serious results are expected, but he will be laid up for some time.

Joseph Pathos, a native of Poland, now working in the mills of Proctor, has been fined \$10.51 for breaking quarantine, which had been declared against his house because of scarlet fever in the family. It is said that he broke quarantine because there was no food in the house and no one seemed to care where there was any or not.

Mrs. Jennie Hunter of Rutland is suffering considerably from bruises received last Saturday, when she was run down by an electric car. She was crossing the street just as a car was on its way uptown from the barn. She happened to be looking towards the north and did not see the car, walking directly in front of it. She was hit by the fender and as she lost her footing, grabbed the fender and was dragged about 20 feet before the car stopped.

The nerves of "Jack" Howard, who drives a team for Rutland City, were badly jarred, and he incidentally came near giving the city hall a considerable jar the other day, when on opening a box he had taken to the city building, he found that its contents were largely dynamite and a quantity of caps. Not knowing that the box contained any explosives Howard used no care in handling it and allowed it to drop from the wagon as heavily as if it had been so much harmless clay.

Edward Spry of Sherbrooke, P. Q., an American express messenger on the B. & M. train between Sherbrooke and Newport, and well known in the northern part of the state, shot himself at the Grand Trunk station in Sherbrooke, Wednesday night. The bullet entered his side close to the heart, and though he was taken to the hospital and operated upon at once, he died Friday morning. He was 28 years of age and unmarried. He had been in the employ of the American company for some years. Disappointed love is the reported cause for the rash act.

J. H. Smith of Walden died Monday at Brightwood hospital in St. Johnsbury from the effects of injuries received the preceding Friday at the mill of the National Flooring company at St. Johnsbury. Mr. Smith was unloading sawdust at the mill, when in some manner his clothing caught in the shafting and he was rapidly revolved in it, the clothing being stripped from his body. His right arm was badly crushed. He was 31 years old.

He is survived by a wife, who was Miss Helen M. Moore of East Berklair and a brother, Dr. W. W. Hutchinson, of this place. His father and mother died but a few years ago.

TO TRY ACCUSED.

Special Term of Chittenden County Court to be Called.

Burlington, Jan. 7.—A special term of county court in Chittenden county has been called by Judge Waterman for January 18, pursuant to the provisions of section 1350, public statutes, when a grand jury will be summoned in the Cooper case.

The section above referred to, 1350 of the public statutes, reads as follows: Section 1350. Special sessions. The presiding judge of the county court may, in his discretion, at any time, order a special session of such court for the trial of criminal causes.

The case, as the public well knows, is that of a colored soldier, John E. Cooper, charged with the murder of James Williams at a Winoski resort about two weeks ago.

Summary of 1910 Weather.

The summary of weather reports for the year 1910 has just been issued from the Burlington bureau and is recorded as follows: The highest temperature recorded was 92 degrees on July 10, and the lowest 17 degrees below zero on January 5 and February 7. There were 32 clear, 150 partly cloudy and 195 cloudy days. The percentage of sunshine for the year was below the normal for this vicinity. The greatest depth of snow on the ground at 3 p. m. was 21.0 inches, February 18. Greatest snowfall in 24 hours, 8.8 inches, February 17 and 18. Last killing frost, May 6. Last light frost, June 5. First thunderstorm, April 6. The last thunderstorm was October 1. First light frost, September 15. First killing frost, October 30. First snow, October 27. Greatest snowfall in 24 hours, 8.3 inches, December 20 and 21. Greatest depth of snow on ground at 8 p. m., 12.0 inches, December 21.

DR. F. S. HUTCHINSON DEAD.

Prominent Enosburg Falls Man, Who Was Recently Injured.

Enosburg Falls, Jan. 7.—Dr. Frederick S. Hutchinson, prominent physician and surgeon of this place, died at 4:25 yesterday afternoon from heart failure, resulting from a cerebral operation performed late the night before. He was operated on for rupture of the intestines, sustained Tuesday morning, when he was thrown from his sleigh against a hydrant.

Dr. Hutchinson was born in Enosburg March 27, 1861, and was the youngest son of Dr. and Mrs. W. R. Hutchinson. He was educated in the district schools; graduated from Montpelier academy in 1877 and from the medical department of the university of Vermont in 1882.

He has served the town as school director and health officer, holding the latter office from the time of the passage of the town health officer law in 1887 to about three years ago, when he resigned. He was in the legislature of 1904.
