charges were all for parts of the stone crusher which the city purchased of that company, and all of the bills were made out to H. F. Cutler, who was then chairman of the street committee, except one, which was billed to Fred Bruce, superintendent of streets. It was voted to have the clerk see Mr. Cutler and get his opinion as to the right of the company's claim.

A vote was carried, authorizing the mayor to execute the deed between the city and the Barre Railroad company, but the passing of the deed was to be held up until the Barre railroad had paid a deed to the Central Vermont railroad, which was a part of the consideration in the former contract.

The city clerk brought to the attention of the board the coming meeting of the soldiers' monument committee and suggested that if the council wished to be represented at the meeting a committee should be appointed. Alderman Willey thought the suggestion a good one and made a motion that the mayor appoint a committee of three, of which the mayor was to be one, and the motion was carried. Later the mayor appointed on the committee Alderman Thurston and Hoyt.

Alderman Willey stated that since the recent fire on Cliff street there had been considerable discussion over the location of the fire alarm box in that locality. The alderman said that the only alarm box for that whole section from Park street east to Tremont street was the box at the corner of Averill and Park streets, and many of the residents in that section had suggested that another box should be installed at the corner of Cliff and Currier streets to accommodate the residents on the hill above Cliff street. The matter was referred to the fire committee to investigate and report.

Alderman Hoyt of the charity committee reported that the committee, together with the property committee, to whom had been referred the question of the disposition of the Merta property, had decided that the property should be rented to the overseer of the poor for the use of the poor department, and that the overseer should pay at least \$250 rent a year for the house. The alderman said that after the painting and papering had been finished the house would contain two good tenements of four rooms each. The recommendation of the committee was ordered carried out.
