

FIVE MAY DIE OF 12 INJURED

Explosion of Powder in Colliery at Pittston, Pa., Today

ALL WERE BADLY BURNED

Ambulances Were Rushed from Wilkes-Barre to the Scene of the Explosion. One Woman Killed in Philadelphia Laundry.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Jan. 25.—Twelve miners were seriously burned in an explosion in powder colliery No. 10 of the Pennsylvania Coal company at Pittston this morning. Ambulances have been rushed to the mine from this city. Five of the injured are reported to have been fatally burned.

LAFOLETTE IN 1916—A Natural Sequel.

The January American Magazine contains an article by William Allen White entitled, "The Progressive Era and the Insurgent Ducklings," in which the author points out the difference between Roosevelt methods and political principles and those of the insurgents. As an uncompromising type of the latter, Mr. White mentions LaFollette whom he calls a constructive agitator. He says: "Robert M. LaFollette always has played the lone hand in politics. He has regarded victory in any convention, caucus, election, or Congress as of secondary importance. First of all he has desired to educate the people. He has believed that when the people saw the truth, the politicians could not keep the truth of the statute books. So LaFollette has done many rash things from the standpoint of the man who regards politics as a series of maneuvers for his personal triumph. In 1904 he controlled the situation in Wisconsin; but he did not control the federal machine. In electing delegates to the national Republican convention, that year LaFollette's friends elected an uncompromising group of radicals. Senator Spooner would have been glad to split the delegation, and to give LaFollette his share. But LaFollette refused to divide. So Senator Spooner led a contesting delegation to the national convention; the contestants naturally were in sympathy with the national Republican committee. LaFollette's delegation was thrown out and Spooner won. But LaFollette pointed to the people of Wisconsin that sort of an organization the national Republican committee was, and made it obvious that the federal machine in Wisconsin should be destroyed. So it was destroyed and LaFollette's delegation came to the national convention in 1908. There the Wisconsin delegation refused to compromise. The delegation had certain demands for the platform committee. The demands were ignored. The delegation took the LaFollette plank to the floor of the convention, knowing that they would be repudiated, and in the row that followed, the discussion of those planks was so vigorous that the people demanded these planks in the Republican platform after the convention adjourned. So Mr. Taft wrote them into his letter accepting the Republican nomination. Moreover, in his first message to Congress on the railroad bill, President Taft wrote the LaFollette amendments so far as these amendments concerned railroads into his recommendations to Congress.
