



About the State

Saturday's gale opened up Lake Champlain, and there was scarcely a sign of ice outside the breakwater.

Mrs. Callista K. Hodge of Bristol observed her 93d birthday anniversary on Thursday, with a party in the evening.

Mrs. G. W. Johnson of Rutland has an egg laid by one of her Rhode Island Red hens, which measures eight inches in circumference the long way and six and a half inches the other way. Her flock of 50 hens laid 684 eggs from January 1 to the 27th.

E. M. Buck of Montpelier, while tearing out walls in the old jail property, came upon a cunningly made saw shaped from an ordinary knife and filed to a nicety. The saw, evidently the work of some prisoner, was carefully wrapped in a newspaper and hidden between bricks.

Asa E. Fuller, aged 68 years, for years a successful farmer and famous sheep breeder of Pomfret, died at his home there January 21. His death was caused by paralysis. He was born in Pomfret, grew up on his father's farm, became interested in sheep raising and for some years owned the main farm of the Cloud-land property. He represented the town of Pomfret in the legislature one term, was a member of the first board of school directors under the present school system and had held various offices in the town. He was married in 1864 to Miss Christina Anderson.

Asa Jackson was returning to Pittsford from Rutland Saturday evening, on a heavily loaded wagon of turnip, the wagon wheels slowed and threw Mr. Jackson from the load. He became entangled in the reins and the frightened horses ran down a hill, dragging Mr. Jackson the entire distance. The team collided with a telephone pole, breaking a wheel of the wagon but not slackening the speed of the horses. Mr. Jackson was badly cut about the head and there was a trail of blood the length of the hill down which he was dragged. His recovery is looked for.

The need of a heavy snowfall is evidenced all over the state. Brattleboro lumbermen find it difficult to do any work in the woods, the glare ice makes trips to the blacksmith shop necessary every day, and the distance is so great that little time is left to accomplish work. It is next to impossible to cut ice on the river and draw it away, on account of the icy condition of the river bank. In Woodstock, the roadbeds are wearing out and the Bridgewater stage and freighters have been on wheels for some time. The logging business is at a standstill and nothing more can be done in the woods until a foot or two of snow falls.

A meeting has been held at Middlebury by the water commissioners, claim agent McMaster of the Rutland railroad, Fletcher D. Proctor of the Vermont Marble Co., and the land owners through whose land the railroad was running a line of water. No decision was reached, but it is understood that if the railroad company cannot reach a settlement with the water department relative to taking water from the reservoir and the water tanks, permission will be granted to dig a ditch so as to obtain water from the power house of the marble company, which has been under construction at Bellows, to be used for electrical purposes, is nearing completion.

23 CORPORATIONS

Were Chartered by the Vermont Legislature at Recent Term.

The Vermont legislature granted charters to twenty-three corporations, exclusive of religious, educational and others exempt from charter fees. Owen F. Donahue Died Suddenly While at Work in Boston.

Boston, Jan. 31.—Owen F. Donahue, an employe of the Malden Electric Light company, was found unconscious yesterday in the wash room of the company's plant, and died soon after. Medical Examiner Durell of Scovilleville said that death was due to heart trouble. Donahue, who is survived by his wife, was thirty-nine years old and lived at 52 Sterling street, Malden.

He had been sent to call some workmen who were sleeping in another room, and as he was passing through the wash room fell to the floor. Other employes heard the noise of his fall and on investigating, called a doctor. Mr. Donahue was born in Roxbury, Vt., and had lived in Malden twenty-five years.

RUTLAND BUILDING RECORD.

251 Houses, 2 Blocks, 5 Garages and Many Others.

Rutland, Jan. 31.—M. W. Dunn, building inspector, has filed with Mayor H. O. Carpenter his report for 1910 and it shows that the year was a prosperous one in this city in regard to building operations, a good many new structures as well as permanent repairs on old ones having been completed.

Dr. Dunn states that there were 25 houses, two blocks, five garages, one boiler shop, seven barns, 15 poultry houses, a safety deposit vault and 13 sheds erected in the city during the year. In addition to this piazzas were added to 21 houses and additions of other kinds were made to 22 buildings.

JAMES B. MUSSEY DEAD

Had Been Resident of Rutland Nearly All His Life.

Rutland, Jan. 31.—James B. Mussey of Park street, a life-long resident of Rutland, died yesterday at his home after several months' illness with a complication of diseases. Mr. Mussey leaves, besides his wife, formerly Miss Frances E. Claghorn of Wallingford, two daughters, Misses Gertrude A. and Ruth C. Mussey of this city and one son, James H. Mussey of Stockbridge.

Four brothers, William A. and Henry C. Mussey of Atkinson, Ill., Robert E. of El Paso, Tex., and E. P. Mussey of Brooklyn, N. Y., and two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Novers of Atkinson and Mrs. Nellie Curtis of Detroit, Mich., also survive.

The funeral will be at 2 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon at the home.

Mr. Mussey was born on what was formerly known as the Mussey farm south of this city, January 10, 1848, and with the exception of a short time spent in Clarendon had always lived in Rutland.
