Senator John W. Gordon on Intangibles Subject

GOV. MEAD'S VETO OF BILL

Senator Believes That Vote of the House on the Last Day of Legislative Session Showed Strong Conviction for Change.

Editor Times: It is a surprise to those who know the facts that some newspapers are claiming that H. bill 691, providing for a flat rate on intangibles, was little considered by the recent legislature.

after the opening of the session in the morning of Saturday, January 21. As it was probable that there would be no session of either house in the afternoon, and since the bill had been handed me for the purpose of getting it introduced, I saw that it would have to be introduced during the morning session in one house or the other in order to have it printed by Monday.

On the opening day of the session, the tax commissioner was consulted. He stated that he first desired to have a law enacted that would enable him to examine the inventories in enough towns to show more specifically what would be the effect of such a law.

The flat rate bill had been before the legislature in printed form for a much longer time and had in fact previously passed the Senate. As early as January 9, Senator Scribner introduced Senate bill 142, for which Senate bill 172 was in fact a substitute.

The Senate, therefore, passed the bill in the form in which it came from the House. Its friends did not regard the conflict between the two bills as one from which any serious impairment of our revenue was to be anticipated, and they were in as good a situation to judge proper, private of scattering deposits in different banks as is sufficiently broad to accommodate all depositors except a very few.

But the governor evidently thought that there might be grounds for the fears of the opposition and vetoed a bill that would have tended to remedy some of the crying evils of our present situation and would have produced greater and more beneficial results than any law enacted by the legislature of 1910.

Sen. Brown's Speech Causes Sensation

DEMANDS ACTION AT ONCE

Or Will Filibuster—Early Vote Promised by Chairman Burrows of Committee.

Washington, Feb. 2.—Unless the Senate votes at this session on the Lorimer case, the resolution pertaining to the election of senators by the people, the bill to create a permanent tariff board and a general service pension bill, Senator Norris of Nebraska and some of his colleagues who favor the measures named are determined that appropriation bills also shall fail.

Senator Brown, from the floor of the Senate yesterday, said he had no quarrel with the "rule" that appropriation acts come first, but that he would object to its application in the light of the present emergency, unless it is agreed in advance that there shall be votes on the four propositions named before adjournment.
