### ELIMINATES GODDARD AND THEN CHALLENGES BURLINGTON HIGH'S RIGHT TO CHAMPIONSHIP.

Eliminating Goddard seminary from the reckoning with one sweep of the pen, Newport high school contests with Burlington high school the school basketball championship of Vermont in a letter to the Burlington Free Press to-day. The letter reads as follows:—

Newport high school takes the liberty to claim the basketball championship for high schools in the state of Vermont, on the grounds that Burlington high school, which has previously claimed the championship, has refused to play Newport high school under any conditions.

If Burlington high school wishes to dispute the championship with Newport high school, they will have to play a series of three games under the "School-masters' rules of Vermont," one of these games to be played at Burlington, one at Newport and one on a neutral floor.

Newport high school will not consider Goddard seminary as eligible to dispute for the championship under the "School-masters' rules of Vermont."
