### SUED BY PROBATE COURT.

Unusual Action Brought for Alleged Mismanagement of Estate.

Rutland, April 19.—A rather unusual suit was filed yesterday in Rutland county court, the property of Mary J. and John McGarry of this city being attached for \$1,000 as result of an action brought by the Rutland probate court to recover the bond of Margaret A. McCormack, administratrix of the estate of Michael P. McCormack. The McGarveys were surety for the bond which the probate court claims should have been forfeited on the ground that Mrs. McCormack did not truthfully and properly manage the estate, it being alleged that she converted money to her own use and refused to pay certain heirs money due them when ordered to do so. Judge A. G. Coolidge is at the head of the probate court.

### HELPLESS IN FIRE.

Two Persons Had Trying Experience in Burlington.

Burlington, April 19.—When fire broke out in the cellar of L. J. Sweet's house on Johnson street yesterday afternoon, neighbors carried out Mr. Sweet, who is 79 years of age, and tried to carry out his sister, Miss A. H. Sweet, who is an invalid from a broken back, sustained in a railroad accident two years ago. They found it impossible to remove her unless a portion of the front of the house should be taken out; and this was considered unnecessary. Miss Sweet had fainted, and while firemen were fighting the fire the neighbors stood over her and fanned away the smoke. The fire was soon extinguished.
