Magazine Review.

Secretary of the Treasury, Franklin MacVeagh, and the Express Companies.

Writing under the title of "The Great Express Monopoly," in the April number of the "Magazine," Mr. Albert W. Atwood interestingly describes how Franklin MacVeagh summarily treated the United States Express company that for a long time had had a contract with the government for executing its express business. The story is as follows:

Last year, Franklin MacVeagh, secretary of the treasury, instructed the sub-treasurer to split up mutilated currency into four-part packages and ship them to Washington by registered mail instead of express. The contract between the company and the government provided that all such shipments go by express, but MacVeagh simply disregarded this provision. More important still, he ordered the sub-treasurer at New York to transfer for bankers \$2,000,000 by telegraph to the New Orleans sub-treasurer without in the usual express charges. This was in direct and undisputed violation of the contract.

"How, you may ask, can even the United States government violate a contract? For one thing the contract long ago expired. But as no new arrangement has ever been made, it has hung along from year to year, and until Mr. MacVeagh began to take liberties, the terms have been practically the same as they were not many years ago. In this long period of time the business had increased manifold, but the terms, with a few minor exceptions, have remained to all intents and purposes, unaltered. An insurgent congressman, who recently asked several leaders of Congress why the government did not advertise for new bids was told by Chairman Payne of the ways and means committee that the difficulty is that it is understood that the government gets the bids they will be practically the same. Whether the companies are in collusion or not, dependent saith not, but that is the difficulty."

"Secretary MacVeagh did not care whether or not the express companies were in collusion. He simply broke clauses of the contract which he thought were not in the government's interest, knowing full well that the companies would be only too glad to hold on to what business it could."

"It is quite true that the United States Express company gives the treasury department a moderate rate, twenty cents per \$1,000 on currency shipped over its own lines. But the United States Express company does not operate over the entire country by any means, and about half the shipments made by the government go over other express routes, on which a far higher rate is paid. From Washington to St. Louis, a distance of 1,651 miles, the United States Express company has its own line and the government pays 20 cents per \$1,000. From Washington to Richmond, a distance of 115 miles, the government pays 60 cents per \$1,000. The United States Express company is obliged to pay nearly half the entire business of the treasury department over to the Adams company, and on all this business the government has to pay from 60 cents to \$1 per \$1,000. If the United States company can carry currency at 20 cents per \$1,000 and make a large profit, it is government property, it is admitted to be one of its most profitable, why has not the government made contracts with other companies at similar rates?"

"MacVeagh is only one of the long line of treasury officials who protested against the contract, but he was the first to whom the thought occurred that it was possible to disregard an instrument which had long since ceased to be binding."

Dr. and Mrs. W. S. Webb, Mr. and Mrs. J. Watson Webb, W. Seward Webb, Jr., Vanderbilt Webb and Miss Gaynor, who returned to New York from Shelburne last Sunday night, expect to sail soon for England to be present at the coronation of George V.

Dr. John H. Dods of Burlington, captain of the medical corps, first regiment, V. N. G., has been ordered to San Antonio, Tex., to participate in the manoeuvres of the war department. This is a handsome recognition of Dr. Dods' long and faithful service in the state militia.

During the past winter alighting began there November 14, and lasted until April 6, a period of 143 days. On 96 days during that time the thermometer stood at zero or below.



He was taken the Brattleboro Memorial hospital.

Old Record Books Unearthed at Rutland. While cleaning out some of the archives of the Rutland Congregational church recently, some interesting record books were brought to light, of proceedings in the parish meetings before 1800. The oldest record book dates back to 1788 and the writing is still fairly legible. On May 29, 1788, the records show that a vote of the parish was taken "to raise 50 pounds to provide preaching for the coming year, the same to be paid in beef, pork, butter, cheese, flour or any merchantable grain." The preaching was done at this time by a Mr. Hibard, who was engaged for only two or three Sundays at a time. It was not until 1800 that the method of raising money by voluntary subscription was adopted. As previous to that time a tax had been assessed of four cents and three mills on the dollar of the polls and salable real estate in the parish. After adopting the voluntary system the salary of ministers began to increase and in 1800 the pastor, Rev. Thomas Hall, was paid \$433.34 for his year's work. The first regular pastor was Rev. Samuel Williams, 1789 to 1795. The Bible he used is still among the church records.

"GOOD FOR VERMONT" That Is What Labor Bulletin Says About Labor Legislation. Under the caption, "Good for Vermont," the Weekly News letter, published by the American Federation of Labor, has the following: "That the trade unionists of the country are becoming alive to the influence which it can assert along legislative lines is illustrated by the accomplishments of the Vermont state branch of the American Federation of Labor. It is not an easy task to initiate new legislation into the legislative halls of our country, but the Vermont state branch long tried to do this in an open or indirect manner. The officials of the state branch therefore are entitled to much credit for the excellent results accomplished during the last session of the Vermont legislature. The sum total gained can best be told in the language of our informant, secretary of the state organization, Alexander Ironsides: "As a result of organized effort, there was enacted an employers' liability bill, voluntary compensation plan on lines adopted in New York state; a valuable amendment to the child labor law, making it the best law in New England; a bill to amend the state constitution, giving the legal voters the right to say whether compulsory compensation should be legislated. We were also successful in defeating a bill designed to establish compulsory arbitration. We are well pleased with the fruits of the session."


