

TO PUNISH OIL OFFICIALS

Senate Asks if Steps Have Been Taken

DEMANDS INFORMATION

Of Department of Justice—Rockefellers, Rogers and Others Named—The Resolution Is Adopted Without Any Debate.

Washington, May 24.—The Senate yesterday afternoon without discussion passed a resolution introduced by Senator Pomeroy of Ohio reciting the recent decision of the Standard Oil case by the supreme court and calling on the attorney general for information as to what, if any criminal prosecutions have been begun against John D. Rockefeller and the other officials of Standard Oil or the corporations affected. The resolution recites that the law makes the corporations and individuals responsible for the combination in restraint of trade amenable to criminal prosecution. The resolution is preliminary to another one by Senator Pomeroy directing criminal prosecutions to be begun.

PRIOR CONVICTION STANDARD OIL PLEA

Asks Quashing of Indictment in Prosecution for Taking Rebates from Olean, N. Y., to Burlington.

Rochester, N. Y., May 24.—The trial of the Standard Oil company on an indictment charging acceptance of rebates on oil shipments from Olean, N. Y., to Burlington, Vt., was resumed before Judge Hazel in the United States district court this morning. The special plea made by Daniel J. Kenefick in support of his motion to quash the indictment was something of a surprise to the attorneys for the government. The plea was made Monday afternoon and court adjourned to enable the attorneys to get together on the subject if possible.

The argument made by Mr. Kenefick was that the Standard Oil company had been convicted of the crimes charged in the indictment and had paid a fine following conviction; and that it is unlawful and unconstitutional to punish a man or corporation

TY COBB IN WILD DASH CATCHES AUTO THIEF

Detroit Baseball Star Recovers Machine by Risking His Own Life.

Detroit, May 24.—Tyrus Cobb, centre fielder of the Detroit American League Baseball club, after a sensational sprint across Cadillac square Monday night, succeeded in recovering his automobile and capturing 19-year-old John Miles, who borrowed it without permission. Miles was locked up.

Cobb's automobile, which was presented to him last fall for his batting prowess, was standing empty in front of a hotel, but the owner was in another car nearby when Miles cranked up. A few moments later the chase was on and after a sprint of over 100 yards Cobb, disregarding consequences, leaped into the front and hurled the youth into the street.

Sympathetically Receives Tender of the United States.

STATEHOOD FOR TWO

Arizona and New Mexico to be Admitted

WITH CERTAIN CONDITIONS

House Adopts Resolution on Viva Voce Vote—Does Not Approve Recall or New Mexico's Provision for Amendments.

Washington, May 24.—The joint resolution admitting Arizona and New Mexico to immediate statehood, and withholding approval of the constitutions of both states until the people shall have voted on certain proposed amendments to them, passed the House of Representatives yesterday afternoon by a viva voce vote. No roll call was demanded in the final vote. On a preceding motion to recommit the resolution made by Republican leader Mann, 31 Republicans voted with the Democrats, defeating the motion 214 to 57. The resolution requires Arizona to vote on an amendment removing the recall provision as it applies to judges and requires New Mexico to vote on an amendment making its constitution more easily amendable. Neither state is required to adopt amendments proposed by Congress. Whatever the result of the proposed referendums, the constitutions of the new states will stand finally approved.

The resolution passed in the form proposed by the Democratic majority of the committee on territories. Efforts were made by the Republicans to force Arizona to vote out of its constitution the recall of judges and to give immediate and unqualified approval to the New Mexican constitution. Both provisions were rejected. The Democrats declared that the proposal to force Arizona to reject the recall was an effort to keep that state out of the union. The Democratic resolution said Chairman Flood of the territories committee, presented the fairer method, namely to leave to the people of the state the determination of the recall question. Notwithstanding this attitude, Democratic orators bitterly denounced the recall of judges during the afternoon's debate. The House adjourned following the vote until Friday.

LEAVE MOTHER CHURCH.

Two Christian Science Societies Vote to Secede.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 24.—E. A. Smith, C. S. D., of the Fourth Church of Christ, Scientist, here yesterday gave of the Associated Press a copy of a resolution adopted at a meeting of the church members by which, by a vote of 93 to 3, the members decided to withdraw from the mother church at Boston.

The reasons given in the resolution are that "since the death of Mrs. Eddy, the Christian Science board of directors has absolute authority to control the teaching" and that the board condemned Christian Science as taught by Abbott Smith, who was a personal student of Mrs. Eddy. The congregation, therefore, declared itself severed from the mother church and that its articles be amended so as to become a Christian Science Reformed church. The statement also announces that similar action was taken by the Second Church of Christ, of Duluth, with only one dissenting vote.

THE VIEWS OF DR. W. D. GRANT

Presbyterian Clergyman Accused of Heresy

DEFENDS HIS POSITION

Quotes From the Authorities—Says He Has Never Knowingly Violated His Ordination Vow.

Atlantic City, N. J., May 24.—Rev. William D. Grant of Northumberland, Pa., who is accused of heresy, yesterday appeared before the judicial commission of the Presbyterian general assembly and was given a chance to speak. He denied that it is unorthodox in his views and attempted to justify his broad conception of God, Christ and the miracles by quoting from sermons preached by Rev. Charles Little of Wabash, Ind., moderator of last year's assembly. He also gave quotations from sermons of Rev. Dr. Jowett, the minister who was brought here from England to fill the pulpit of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church, New York.

According to Doctor Grant, both these clergymen in sermons during the present session of the assembly referred to a broader conception of theology that was prevalent nowadays, which was giving the people a better and clearer understanding of the deity. Doctor Grant said in part: "The appellee would state without reservation that his purpose and method has ever been, as it is now, to confirm men in the truth as it is in Jesus and as presented in the doctrinal standards of the Presbyterian church. "So far as he is aware, the appellee has never knowingly violated his ordination vows or departed from Holy Scripture as the infallible rule for faith and life. "The church is certainly broad enough to permit diversity of opinion on matters not essential to salvation. That it was a physical impossibility for "Christ to have stood on the pinnacle of the temple at Jerusalem and been tempted by Satan," as related in the New Testament, was one of the startling statements attributed to Dr. Grant at the heresy trial before the permanent judicial committee. Dr. Grant is charged with having said the topmost pinnacle was entirely too small for anyone to stand upon it. In commenting on the death of Uzziah, who, as told in the Old Testament, was struck dead for daring to put his hand on the Ark of the Covenant while that precious relic was being taken from the threshing floor of Hebron to the temple of Jerusalem, Dr. Grant is alleged to have said: "This man Uzziah must have had an aneurism of the heart or have burst a blood vessel in his head. It was not reasonable to suppose that God struck him dead under such circumstances. All Uzziah was trying to do was to prevent the sacred ark from slipping from the wagon or sledge on which it was being carried. Evidently the weight of the ark was too much of a strain and the man dropped dead." Dr. Grant was also accused of having told a member of his church that he intended "to cast the devil out of the Bible" by preaching a certain sermon.

There is much interest in the heresy trial. Some of the remarkable statements credited to Dr. Grant follow: "Moses had the blues when he wrote some of his poems. "There is no personal devil. "Eve found sin in her own heart and was not tempted by Satan. "Christ was crucified in a perfectly natural manner by a mob of fanatical Jews, and did not plan his own crucifixion. Such remarks as these are against every basic doctrine of the church and indicate say his prosecutors, that Dr. Grant does not believe in the divine inspiration of the scriptures. These statements alleged to have been made by Dr. Grant in sermons and writings are contained in the testimony against him. This testimony fills a book of more than 300 pages. Among other startling theories said to have been advanced by the accused clergyman is a positive denial that there ever was such a man as Jonah, and that neither Christ nor any one else acts as mediator between God and man.

Albany, May 24.—Gov. Dix sent to the Senate Monday night the nomination of Joseph F. Scott of Elmira as superintendent of state prisons, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Cornelius V. Collins of Troy. The nomination was referred to the Senate finance committee. Col. Scott is considered one of the most eminent penologists in the United States. He was superintendent of the Massachusetts state prison at Concord many years and became superintendent of the Elmira reformatory in 1903. Col. Scott was superintendent of the Elmira reformatory until 1906, when he was appointed superintendent of reformatories. Since that time both the Elmira and Napanoch reformatories have been in his charge. By a vote of 28 to 9, the Senate last

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
